Heavy Storm—Departure of Captain General Dulce's Wife for Europe—Excitement in Havana Over President Grant's Message—Sympathizers of the Revolution Disappointed—The Spaniards Satisfied—Attack on a Spanish Provision Train by the Patriots.

HAVANA, Dec. 8, 1869.

A heavy storm from the north has prevailed for the last two days.

Count Pozos and General Dulce's wife have sailed for Europe, but for what cause is at present unknown.

The message of President Grant, which was telegraphed here from New York on Tuesday and published in the papers of this morning, has caused intense excitement. The sympathizers with the revolution are disappointed, but the Spaniards are satisfied, and look upon the message as a harbinger of peace and prosperity in the island.

The news from the interior of the island is unimportant.

While a body of troops were conveying provisions from Manzanillo to Las Tunas they were attacked by insurgents. The fight lasted two days, from morning until night. The losses are unknown. The insurgents harassed the troops the entire distance, but the convoy reached Las Tunas.
