Conflagration—Revolutionary Proclamation— Houses Searched for Suspected Persons— Citizens Banished—News from the Interior.

HAYANA, Dec. 23, 1869.

A large fire occurred last night on Prado street, which is generally supposed to be the work of an incendiary.

An inflammatory proclamation has been circulated in the city calling the Havanese to fly to arms and aid the insurgents fighting in the interior.

Many houses, generally belonging to prominent Cubans, were searched last night by the police. Forty well known citizens have received peremptory orders to leave for Spain in the Cadiz steamer, which sails to-morrow. Among the banished are Ricardo and Enrique Repasie, Serafin Pachecho, Silverio Jorria, Emilio Cespedes, Carlos Font and Francesco Mestro. These orders will probably be followed up by the transportation of all suspected or guilty parties of prominence. It is supposed that these measures will put a finishing blow to the insurrection.

A Cuban was arrested yesterday for trying to induce some Catalan volunteers to shout "Viva Cuba." He will be tried by court martial.

The tenor of the news from the interior is unfavorable to the insurgents. Many are soliciting pardon, and where they continue to resist the troops are slowly but surely driving them back. A battalion of Catalan volunteers arrived to-day from Spain.

The Haytian Steamer Mary Anne Still in Port.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, Dec. 17, 1869.

The Haytian steamer Mary Anne, which arrived here on the 3d, and was detained by the authorities, but was subsequently released, is still here, in a wretched condition. She was bound to Boston, from Port au Prince, with logwood.
