Reorganization of the Cuban Juntas in New Orleans—Aldama to Direct the Future Movements—Something Important in Prospect.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 29, 1862.

The Lillian ~~Gasco~~ and the failure of other movements of the Cuban insurgents from this quarter have brought about an entire redistribution of forces, which it is expected will result in better planned and more successful effort.

Under the inspiration of Aldama, the wealthy

New York Cuban, a junta has just been formed in New Orleans, with Dr. Diaz, (ex-editor of the *Libertad*, defunct organ of the Cuban patriots in the South) as president, and men of energy and action as his associates.

Divided counseLS, timidity and lack of judgment have hitherto characterized every Cuban movement made from New Orleans. These defects are no longer apparent. Though scarcely settled in its organization, the new junta is supposed to have already laid a train for a big explosion. There are understood to be several vessels between here and St. Louis, which are likely to be brought into the Cuban service, and the peculiar advantages which New Orleans presents as a point of departure are to be made the most of.

No attempt is likely to be made to send out any expeditions of filibusters. Neither time nor place is propitious for such an enterprise. But arms, stores and munitions of war would find their way into the insurgent camp in Cuba, and these can be better sent from New Orleans than from anywhere else.
