

THE REVOLUTION IN CUBA.

Ladies' Association for the Benefit of the Sick and Wounded—Concert at Steinway Hall—An Appeal to the Charitable.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE HERALD:—

War, fierce and relentless war, has at last broken out in our beloved country. The opponents of the wishes of the Cubans are Spaniards, and no belligerent rights have as yet been granted to the former. For more than four months the fighting has been going on in half of the island. Armies of patriots more or less numerous, more or less well organized, all the while have been moving through the land. Encounters very often take place between the patriots and the Spanish soldiers, and although the former may not always stand the ground, as their policy is not to fight regular battles, yet blood is spilt and many wounded and sick die for want of medicines, which no money can buy, as the Spanish government holds all the large maritime towns on the island.

In order to remedy this evil as much as is in the power of women to do, a large number of the ladies of Cuba residing in New York have formed an association under the name of "The Cuban Ladies' Association for the Relief of the Sick and Wounded in the Patriot Army of Cuba." They appeal to the heart of every benevolent person in this country to help them and promote their efforts in raising funds and getting medicines, bandages, lint and surgical instruments for the sick and wounded Cubans in the field.

As a means to acquire needful resources the Cuban Ladies' Association Executive Committee have arranged to give a grand instrumental and vocal concert on the 9th of March next at Steinway Hall, Fourteenth street, and the tickets are now for sale in the hands of the committee and their friends and at the St. Julien Hotel, Washington place. From the success thus far obtained they feel encouraged in their efforts, and hope the press will aid them with their support.

For this reason I have been charged by the Cuban Ladies' Committee to request of you the publication in your valuable paper of the present card.
