### CUBA.

Landing of an Expedition in Cuba—News from Cespedes—The Fabian Policy Adopted by the Cubans.

CHARLESTON, March 9, 1869.

The steamer Henry Burden, which, it will be remembered, left Jacksonville, Fla., a month since, with a large number of Cubans on board ostensibly for Nassau, N. P., has successfully accomplished her voyage.

I learn that she passed by Nassau and landed her expedition on the north side of Cuba, at a place a few miles from the town of Mayari, where General Cespedes was waiting for the war material she had on board.

The expedition was under the command of Señor Cisneros, who a few months ago was editor of *El Pais* newspaper in Havana. It comprised something over 100 young Cubans, many of them of the best families of Havana, who were all well armed with Peabody rifles, revolvers and short swords, several pieces of field artillery and a number of expert artillerists. In addition to these the Henry Burden landed 5,000,000 of ball cartridges and a large assortment of other war material.

General Cespedes was at Mayari with a large force well supplied with munitions, but very enthusiastic and confident in the success of the cause—free Cuba. He would continue the Fabian policy in his war with the Spanish troops until his forces should become better armed, and the disparity in this respect between the two armies should be reduced.

Disappearance of the Cholera—Serenade to General Fuella—Plantations Being Destroyed Near Manzanillo and Santa Cruz.

HAVANA, March 10, 1869.

The negroes and mulattoes have tendered a serenade to General Fuella at Santo Espiritu.

The insurgents are burning the plantations and scattering general destruction in the vicinity of Manzanillo and Santa Cruz.

The cholera has entirely disappeared in the neighborhood of Santiago de Cuba.

There are heavy shipments of sugar and molasses now being made for the United States from all the ports of the island.

The steamship Columbia arrived here this morning from New York.
