CHARLESTON, March 9, 1869.

The steamer Henry Burden, which, it will be remembered, left Jacksonville, Fla., a month since,
with a large number of Cubans on board ostensibly
for Nassau, N. P., has successfully accomplished her

Voluge.

I learn that she passed by Nassau and 'landed her expedition on the north side of Cuba, at a place a new miles from the town of Mayari, where General Cespedes was waiting for the war material she had on board. The expedition was under the command of Senor Asseros, who a few months ago was editor of El Paus newspaper in Havana. It comprised some-

It comprised some-thing over 100 young Cubans, many of them of the best families of Havana, who were all well armed with Peabody rines, revolvers and short swords, several pieces of field artillery and a number of expert artillerists. In addition to these the Henry Burden landed 5,000,000 of ball cartridges and a large assortment of other war material. large association to other war material.

General Cespedes was at Mayari with a large force
ith supplied with munitions, but very enthusiastic
and confident in the success of the cause—free
Cuba. He would continue the Pablan policy in his

war with the Spanish troops until his forces should become better armed, and the disparity in this re-spect between the two armies should be reduced. Disappearance of the Cholera-Screenede to General Parlio-Plantations Being Destroyed Near Manzanillo and Santa Cruz.

HAVANA, March 10, 1869. The negroes and mulattoes have tendered a sere nade to General Puello at Santo Espiritu. The insurgen's are burning the plantations and scattering general destruction in the vicinity of Man-
