The government has received and made official despatches giving details of the adva General Lesca from La Guanaja to Puerto Pri ce of On this march the heaviest engagements since the eginning of the rebellion was fought. General esca found the enemy, to the number of 4,000, trongly entrenched on the Sierra de Cubitas. Arstrongly strong entertacted on the sterra de contest. Ar-tillery was brought up and commenced a vigorous fire upon the works. Covered by the batteries a column of regular troops, 1,500 strong, attacked the enemy's fortifications with the bayonet. Both sides

enemy's fortifications with the bayonet. Both sides fought with determination, and the havoe was fearful. General Lesca reports his loss at thirty-one killed and eight wounded. The loss of the rebels is estimated at 1,000 killed and wounded.
