WHAT WILL SPAIN DO?-The resolution on Cuba adopted by the House of Representatives on Saturday last has doubtless ere this been laid before the members of the Spanish Cortes at Madrid. What will they do about it? It will certainly give them a pretty clear understanding of the frailty of their tenure of office on the "ever faithful Island;" but Spanish pride and Spanish folly are hard to overcome. Otherwise they would propose the sale of Cuba to the United States, cheap for cash. As it is, the present Spanish government, having evidently no great desire to cultivate the special protection of Louis Napoleon, will probably look to England for assistance, and how far England or her capitalists may be disposed to go in 'advancing funds for any political purpose opposed to the interests of the United States was illustrated in that

famous rebel cotton loan. In any event, begining with the Spanish Cortes, we have no doubt that this Cuban resolution from the American

Congress will make a sensation from Spain to

England.
