CUBA.

A Spanish Canard—General Dulce Compli-
ments the Volunteers—The Woods Surround-
ing Puerto Principe Set on Fire—Insurgents
Massing Near Cinco Villas.

HAVANA, March 12, 1869.

The *Diario* reports that the insurgents at Sigüenza decapitated a young girl and shot two others.

Brigadier General Tetonla, of the Spanish army, has arrived at Havana.

Captain General Dulce, at a recent meeting of officers, made a speech in which he highly complimented the volunteers for their courage and zeal.

The *Diario* says the woods surrounding Puerto Principe have been set on fire, and adds that the troops will soon clear the vicinity of rebels.

Many small bands of insurgents are operating near Cinco Villas. Their numbers are increasing in the vicinity of Santiago de Cuba, and it is supposed they are going to Cinco Villas, where they will mass their forces. This movement, it is thought, explains the recent disappearance of the rebels from the jurisdiction of Jiguane.

A report was in circulation yesterday that Cespedes had been captured; but it proves to be unfounded.

The steamship *Teutonia*, from New Orleans for Hamburg, arrived to-day.
