Cuba. Despatches from Havana state that the recent reports of the landing of fillustring expeditions are unfounded. The Sparsh cruisers are watching

so carefully that it is almost impossible for an expedition of the kind to escape them.

Mr. La Reintric, tate Vice Gonsul at Havana, had an interview with President Grant yesterday on Cuban affairs. He has been frequently in the interior of the island, and save that the Cubans will certainly

succeed, as their policy of barassing the Spaniards by avoiding decisive engagements was proving very effective.

Higation there, and seems to be taking on Cuban men, arms and munitions under the open eyes of the British officials without any interference.

The steamer Florda, now Jing at Chester, in the Delaware river, is to be detailed by the Collector of Philadelphia, by order of Secretary Boutwell, who suspects that the vessel is in the Interests of the Cubans.
