THE WAR IN CUBA.-The steamer Salvador, which lately ran from Key West to St. Thomas, has just returned to that island from Cuba, after landing some three hundred volunteers, with arms and ammunition, for the revolutionary forces. Seven hundred sympathizers were landed, and engaged almost immediately with the Spanish regulars. The raw levies fought bravely, and the struggle was, as usual, very severe. The volunteers are said to have had sixty men killed and 160 wounded, while the Spaniards sustained only a slight loss. It must be borne in mind, however, that the account comes from government sources. If the war should endure for any lengthened period Cuba will be desolated; it may be almost barbarized. On her arrival at St. Thomas the Salvador was assessed in a fine of four thousand pounds sterling for having left port with an excess of passengers. England is becoming very deli-

cate and careful in her construction of international law. Who or what does she fear?
