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**Wealthy Spaniards Think More Troops Needed—Opinion of General Dulce—Insubordination of Negro Volunteers—Operations of Insurgents—Action of the British in Relation to Spanish Outrages.**

HAVANA, April 7, 1893.

At a meeting of wealthy Spaniards at the palace, to-day, the necessity for more troops from Spain was suggested. Captain General Dulce, in response, pleaded the poverty of the government.

Insurrectionary demonstrations in the Yuclo Abajo district are reported.

The mobilized negro volunteers at Neuvas have become quite insubordinate and threatening.

Advices from Sagua la Grande to the 6th represent the insurgents as operating in the vicinity of Remedios and the Sagua la Chica. Troops left Sagua la Grande quite suddenly, but on what expedition is not known.

Jamaica advices to Saturday last state that Commodore Phillimore, of the royal navy, will demand the release of all vessels captured in British waters, the liberation of their crews, and an explanation and indemnity for the outrage. He will also demand an explanation of the Spaniards landing on British territory in pursuit of Cubans. If the Spanish authorities do not respond to these demands in a satisfactory manner he will make reprisals.

The United States flagship Contocook has arrived here.

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
