Jamaica advices to Saturday last state that Com-

modore Thillimore, of the royal navy, will demand the release of all vessels captured in British waters, tae liberation of their drews, and an orplanation and indemnity for the outrage. He will also demand an explanation of the Spaniardes landing on British territory in pursuit of Cubans. If the Spanish authorities do not respond to these demands in a satisfactory manuer he will make reprisals.
