

Landing of an Expedition on the Coast of Macambo—Its Destruction.

The news from Baracoa is that on the 3d inst. an expedition of adventurers landed on the beach of Macambo, composed of 120 individuals, mostly Cuban lawyers, notaries and students, who came, according to the narration of a prisoner, to take possession of the government of that jurisdiction—Baracoa—it having been stated in New York that our troops were in the woods and the rebels in possession of all the ports in the island.

The moment it was known a landing was effected a detachment of twenty regulars and 600 mobilized volunteers were sent to the spot. The filibusters were speedily surrounded and four so-called generals were taken, together with 700 Armstrong piston guns, two brass cannon, eighty boxes munitions and a quantity of printed notes of the "Bank of the Cuban Republic" to the amount of \$2,000,000, in notes of \$1, \$5, \$10 and \$50.

We are told that the moment our Captain General received the information he sent orders by telegraph to the effect that every filibuster taken prisoner be shot forthwith. Hurrah for our first authority!

We have a letter from Holguin stating that a party of 2,000 rebels attacked a detachment in Onaba, two leagues from town, on the 7th, only numbering forty mobilized volunteers, who defended themselves with great firmness until a column sent by Colonel Obregon arrived to their assistance. The rebels were compelled to fly, losing one cannon, many guns, sabrea, lances, munitions and horses. They left fifty dead on the field, the greater part foreigners. The troops suffered the loss of eight men.
