

THE WAR IN CUBA.—Our advices from Havana, of June 2, tend to realize the anticipation of a general dissolution of society in the island should the Spaniards persevere in their attempt to retain it by force. Dulce has given up the post of Captain General, not awaiting the arrival of his successor, General de Rodas. General Espanao has been left in *locum tenens* by the retiring ruler, who had become quite disgusted with the conduct of the volunteers. Confiscations of property, the arming of volunteers, city riots, a general alarm, another battle, with the reported capture of filibuster guns, go far to show that the colony is not "peace." When will it be quieted? Who has the reversionary interest, or can the Cubans manage their own affairs?
