

Spanish Account of the Battle at Nipe Bay— Filibusters Surprised—Their Arms, Ammu- nition and Supplies Captured.

WASHINGTON, June 6, 1869.

A letter from a Spanish source which may be regarded as semi-official, dated Havana, May 30, speaks of a recent encounter with filibusters in the Bay of Nipe, somewhere about the 11th of May. They were, it is said, surprised and dispersed by one of the Spanish military columns. Three or four of the invaders, designated as foreigners, the only prisoners taken, were summarily shot. It is added that the cargo of the vessel in which the filibusters landed fell into the hands of the Spaniards. It consisted of twelve pieces of artillery, 150,000 cartridges, with other ammunition, and a large number of barrels of hard bread and potatoes.
