ANOTHER BATTLE IN CUBA

The Spanish Advance Driven Into
Nuevitas.

**Engagement Near Baga—The Spaniards Forced
to Fall Back Upon Nuevitas—General Poello
Killed.**

HAVANA, July 12, via KEY WEST, July 14, 1869.

General Poello, at the head of 300 Spanish marines, was attacked by a force of patriots near Baga, a small town situated on the same bay as Nuevitas, and not far from that city.

The marines were forced to fall back upon Nuevitas, with a loss of eighty, including General Poello, killed.

**Cholera Diminishing and Vomito Appearing—
The Organization of the Cubans—Further
Particulars of the Fight at Baga—Large
Numbers of Patriots Around Principe—
Movements of General Jordan.**

HAVANA, July 13, via KEY WEST, July 15, 1869.

Advices from Nuevitas to the 10th report that the cholera was diminishing, but that the vomito had appeared among the troops.

According to the new organization of the patriot forces there are to be only two major generals in the army, of which General Jordan is one, and holds command of the entire Eastern or Bayamo department, while General Ignacio Agramonte is the other, in command of the Central department.

The Spaniards are endeavoring to ignore the manner in which their detachment of soldiers was recently captured at Sabana Nueva. It is rumored that General Quesada has ordered the officers shot in retaliation for the execution of patriot prisoners.

Further particulars of the fight near Baga have been received. The Spanish force numbered 500 marines, who were surprised by seventy insurgents under Francisco Castillo, ambuscaded behind palm groves. Both sides sustained a spirited fire for half an hour. The marines, being afraid of the machetes carried by the Cubans, refused to obey an order to charge bayonets, and the insurgents, despite the superior numbers of the enemy, retired across an open field in perfect order, firing in full view of the Spaniards and inflicting severe loss upon them. But one patriot was wounded. The marines fell back to Nuevitas, so exhausted by the effects of the climate that many of them were carried into the city on stretchers.

General Letona has ordered Lieutenant Medina to be shot at Puerto Principe.

In the woods surrounding Puerto Principe thousands of insurgents are concentrating and are only waiting to be armed with the Peabody breech-loading rifles, with bayonets, to assume offensive operations.

Tinker (?) is alive.

Holdquin, one of the insurgent leaders, intends to go to the United States for the purpose of bringing back a force of Americans.

Intelligence from Santiago de Cuba to the 8th inst., reports fighting going on at a point thirty miles distant from that city. The patriots were strongly entrenched.

Major General Jordan had joined the Cubans under General Figueredo, and now commands a large force.

The Governor of Baracoa was actively engaged in burning property and killing all who fell into his hands.

Arrest of a Railroad President—Orders Relating to Confiscated Property—Reported Engagements—Provisions Scarce at Puerto Principe.

HAVANA, July 15, 1869.

General Echaverria, President of the Havana Railroad, has been arrested and will sail for Spain to-morrow.

Notaries have received orders not to record the sales of confiscated property in certain districts as a precautionary measure to prevent its destruction by the rebels.

The volunteers last night serenaded Generals Ferrer, Canto and Lesca.

Three recent engagements are reported, in which the rebels were defeated. No particulars are given.

There is a scarcity of provisions at Puerto Principe, and the authorities are distributing food to the inhabitants.
