

THE CUBANS.

No change took place yesterday in the status of the Cuban prisoners held securely safe within the casemated walls of Fort Lafayette. Judge Pierrepont, United States District Attorney, it is understood, proceeded to Long Branch, and had an interview with President Grant in relation to the matter of what is to be done with the elephant on Uncle Sam's hands.
