

THE CUBAN FILIBUSTERS.

Probable Discharge of the Prisoners To-Day—Names of the Captives—The Grand Army of the Republic Calls Upon the Government for the Recognition of Cuba.

This morning District Attorney Pierrepont, Marshal Barlow and United States Commissioners White and Shields will proceed to Fort Lafayette to take some action with regard to the Cuban filibusters recently captured at Gardiner's Island and who have been confined in the fort since Saturday last. It has not transpired, however, what action is to be taken in the matter—whether the object is to arrest the prisoners on formal warrants or to discharge them on giving bonds to keep the peace. In all probability, however, they will be discharged on their own recognizances, as was the former batch. ACTION OF THE GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC.

The Grand Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic of the State of New York has been holding its annual session during the past two days at Booth's theatre, concluding yesterday. About 250 delegates were in attendance, representing nearly 100 posts, Vice Commander Colonel E. W. Lansing presiding. A special committee on the Cuban question, comprising General H. A. Barnum, G. W. Brown, J. H. Murray, M. H. Ellis and J. H. McKean, presented the following report, preamble and resolutions, which were adopted unanimously yesterday afternoon:—

NEW YORK, July 22, 1902.

TO THE GRAND ENCAMPMENT OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK:—

Your committee to whom was referred the resolution on Cuba would respectfully report that, while they favor a resolution of sympathy for the cause of Cuba, still they deem it inexpedient that a resolution requesting the administration to recognize Cuba as a belligerent Power should be adopted. They feel satisfied that the question is perfectly safe in the hands of our President; that delicate and complicated questions of international law are involved, and that those who by their official positions are charged with the duty of superintending our international relations are better capable of determining this question; that our own Grand Commander—whose official relationship with us still exists—would be very much embarrassed in his diplomatic mission in Spain by such a resolution. That in view of the embarrassment which it would occasion to him as well as to our own government we would report against the resolution requesting recognition of Cuba. Your committee offer the following resolution in its stead:—

Whereas it is impossible for those who have themselves carried to a successful issue a fierce and protracted struggle in defence of freedom and their native land to contemplate unmoved the heroic efforts of a sister country to throw off the thralldom which centuries of oppression have made so galling as to be no longer within the bounds of human endurance; and whereas we recognize in the patriot army of Cuba, now so nobly contending against fearful odds, a righteous determination to deliver their beloved land from the tyranny of a foreign Power; therefore be it

Resolved, That we congratulate them on their past success; that we commend and rejoice at their heroic and noble stand against great odds, and hereby extend to them our deepest, warmest and most hearty sympathy, and will hail their day of delivery and independence with heartfelt joy and gratitude.

Resolved, That our government be requested to take such steps as it may deem necessary to prevent the troubles and

barbarities perpetrated by the Spanish troops upon the prisoners of the patriot army and patriot citizens of Cuba.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the government of the United States and furnished the press for publication.

CUBAN VOLUNTEERS AT THE TOMES.

Samuel C. Eeman was yesterday arrested and taken to the Tombs Police Court, before Justice Dowling, on a charge of drawing a dirk knife on Cornelius Gillespie, of No. 1,110 Third avenue. Both were among the enthusiastic volunteers who recently enlisted to fight for the struggling Cubans. They got talking over Cuban matters, when a dispute arose which led to the alleged attempted murderous assault. The accused was committed for trial at the Court of Special Sessions.
