

NAVAL INTELLIGENCE.

The Dictator Off the Battery Again—A Description of the Vessel and List of Her Officers—The Junata Still at the Navy Yard—The River Patrolled by the United States Marshal Every Night.

The iron-clad Dictator, in obedience to orders, did not go to the Navy Yard, but proceeded down the river yesterday, and now lies between Governor's and Bedloe's Islands. She is a single turretted monitor, 3,300 tons register, 315 feet long, 50 feet beam, and has the extraordinary number of fifty six furnaces. Her battery consists of two 15-inch Dahlgren guns, one of which is worked by steam power. She is entirely dependent on her machinery for motive power, there being no masts on which to carry sails, and carries twenty-four officers, 120 firemen and coalheavers, and fifty-one seamen and petty officers. The Junata still lies off the Navy Yard, and her fine appearance attracts considerable attention from the persons passing the yard in the ferry boats.

There is a strict patrol made nightly of the East and North rivers and bay by the tugs belonging to the Navy Yard, under the direction of the United States Marshal, for the purpose of preventing any expeditions departing for Cuba.

Mr. Robeson, Secretary of the Navy, has not yet arrived in the Tallapoosa.

Arrival of the Practice Ship Dale at this Port.

The school ship Dale arrived at this port yesterday from Annapolis, and anchored off the Battery. She left Annapolis on the 3d instant. She had head winds and calms for several days out, and arrived off Cape May on the 11th inst., where the services of a pilot were procured.
