Report About the Cession of Cuba.

MADRID, August 22, 1869.

It is asserted on reliable authority that the pre-
liminaries of a treaty for the cession of Cuba have
been signed.

The Carlists—Cabinet Dissensions—Working-

MADRID, August 22, 1869.

The troops are still pursuing the fugitive Carlists
in the frontier provinces and have taken many
prisoners.

The wife of Polo, the Carlist leader who was cap-
tured at Almagro, has interceded with General Prim
for the life of her husband.

Dissensions have arisen in the Cabinet in regard to
the manner in which the government should pro-
ceed against those bishops who have refused to obey
the late decree of the Regent.

In Barcelona 15,000 workingmen have struck for
higher wages, and others are expected to join them
in the movement. Grave fears are entertained for
the preservation of order.

There is a rumor that General Pezuela, Duke of
Castro, will be exiled to the Canaries.

The Regent, Serrano, positively denies that he sus-
tains the pretensions of the Duke of Montpensier to
the throne of Spain, and declares that he is entirely
neutral on the question of the disposal of the crown.

The French officials have arrested five more Car-
list chiefs on the Spanish frontier.
