Padro-The Spaniards Repaised With Heavy Less. WASHINGTON, August 22, 1809.
Advices from Cuba to the 18th, received by Cuban sympathiters here, give an account of a fight between a portion of General Jordan's command and the troops of Valmaseds, near Pareto Padra, The Cubans, numbering less than six

hundred, were encamped near Puerto Padre, where they were attacked by a force of Spanish regulars

and volunteers over 1,000 strong. In the first sitact, the Cubans were compelled to fall back. They, however, railled, and, securing a more defensively position, repulsed the Spaniards in their second attack. The loss of the Cubans in the contest was 150 in killed, wounded and missing; that of the Spaniards is represented as more than double that number. Colonel Furserro commanded the Cubans.

The fight is reported to have been one of a most desperate character, the Cubans fighting with an earnestness that was irresistable.
