

QUARANTINE.

Yellow Jack Not Yet Dead.

There were two arrivals at Quarantine during the past day or two of vessels which had come in contact with yellow jack either before or after they had left their ports of departure. The first was the bark Cuba, Captain Prince, from Havana. She had six men in hospital at Havana down with yellow fever, and two, the mate, Robert Furnham, and a seaman named Corio, died of the disease. The remainder of the crew came on with the vessel. During the passage the captain's son, aged nine years, died of the disease. Two of the crew were taken down with the fever also on the voyage, but they are now convalescent.

The Fattale, from Rio Janeiro, which left that port on the 11th of June and put into Hampton Roads for orders on the 2d of August, and sailed thence for this port on the 16th inst., was also unfortunate. She left two of her crew and her captain at Rio sick with yellow fever, and three others were prostrated by the disease during the voyage.

Both these vessels are now detained at lower quarantine.
