

THE CUBAN DIAMOND ROBBERY.

The readers of the HERALD will remember that last Wednesday week Charles W. Langley, the "diamond fancier," was arrested by detectives Vaughan and Moore, of the Central office, on suspicion of stealing \$1,000 worth of diamonds from the residence of Lenora G. Villaberde, presidentess of the Cuban Ladies' Aid Society. Langley was one of the occupants of the house No. 113 West Twenty-third street, in which the lady resided, and evidence of a circumstantial character was very strong against him. He was held for trial. A day or two ago the Inspector of Police ordered the residence to be searched by detective Moore, who found in the cellar a diamond pin—a portion of the stolen property. Suspicion then fell upon a domestic in the house, named Mary Murray, who was arrested and taken to the Central Office, where on Wednesday she confessed to a commission of the larceny, and stated that the balance of the property was in the possession of her brother, James Murray, a coachman, in Morrisania. He was also arrested on Wednesday, and admitted that his sister had given him a parcel, which he had not opened. He informed the officer where it was secreted and yesterday the latter proceeded there to recover it if possible. About eight o'clock last night Mr. Moore returned from Morrisania, where he found all the property, that had been secreted under the carriage house of Mr. Black, for whom Murray is coachman. The prisoner will be arraigned at the Tombs this morning.
