Arrival of Cubans at Nassau—They Possess Money to be Expended in War Material—They Also Bring Important Despatches—The Patriots Hopeful and in Good Spirits.

KEY WEST, Sept. 22, 1892.

Five Cubans arrived in Nassau on the 22d inst. from the insurgent camp. General Quesada sent by them \$20,000 to make purchases of arms and other necessities for the conduct of the war.

Important despatches received here for the New York Junta say that the attack on Las Tunas resulted in a victory for the Cubans. All the Spanish soldiers who could not get into the stronghold were taken prisoners and killed. Fifteen Spanish officers who were also made prisoners were shot immediately.

Thousands of Camaguanys are in and around the neighborhood of Puerto Principe without arms.

The patriots throughout the country are in good spirits.

A Spanish General Consoling Himself—The Havana Press and General Sickles' Note—Cubans Asking for Pardon.

HAVANA, Sept. 23, 1892.

General de la Torre arrived here to-night. He gives a flattering account of the progress of the Spaniards in suppressing the insurrection in the Eastern Department.

The Havana journals, in discussing the recent note of General Sickles, United States Minister to Spain, express the wish that he might occupy some post better adapted to his abilities than the present one.

An attempt was lately made to raise the insurgent standard in the Vuelta Abajo region, but it proved a failure. Several Cubans in that section are presenting themselves to the Spanish authorities for pardon.
