RESTORATION OF TELEGRAPHIC WIRES—THE BROTHERS CAYADA.

HAVANA, Feb. 11.—Telegraphic communication between Havana and Sagua la Grande, and Villa Clara, which had been destroyed by the revolutionists, has been restored. It is reported that the leaders of the revolution in the sugar districts of Cienfuegos, Villa Clara, and Trinidad, are Adolfo Cayada and his brother, Frederick Cayada. The former was recently Vice-Consul at Cienfuegos, and was removed at the request of Capt.-Gen. Lerondil. He was colonel of a Philadelphia regiment of Zouaves during the civil war in America. The latter was until last week the American Consul at Trinidad de Cuba, and has just resigned.

MORE ARRESTS—THE INSURRECTION IN THE CENTRAL DEPARTMENT—THE MERCHANTS' AND PLANTERS' MEETING.

EVENING.—Arrests continue to be made by the military and the police of suspected parties in the city and throughout the island. Among the prisoners are many well known planters, merchants, and lawyers. The English Consul at Cardenas is also among those arrested. *La Prensa* says that at present Jimenez, Piatita, and Casanova are the only rebel leaders in the Central Department. None of the other chiefs with their men have appeared. The number of the rebel forces at Camarones is supposed to be 3,000. The meeting of the merchants at the Palace last night, to raise funds for the Government had no decisive result. A mixed commission of merchants and planters was appointed, with instructions to report a feasible plan for supplying the needs of the Government quickly and securely, without imposing additional burdens upon the middle or poorer classes.
