

THE CITY.

E. R. Penslee, M. D., lectures to gentlemen this evening, at the rooms of the Young Men's Christian Association, No. 161 Fifth ave. The lectures will be few, and of a private character.

The fifth Quarterly Convention of the Good Templars of the First Grand District of the I. O. of G. T. will be held to-day, commencing at 1:30 o'clock p. m., at the rooms of the onward Lodge, No. 142 East Eighty-sixth-st.

Thomas Carroll, janitor of the building No. 132 Nassau st., while laboring under a fit of delirium tremens, yesterday morning, jumped from the roof of the six-story building No. 17 Beekman st. into the rear yard, and was dangerously injured. He was removed to Bellevue Hospital, where he died soon afterward.

Last evening, about 7 o'clock, the large show-case which stands in front of Burrow's bookstore, No. 62 Fourth ave., was robbed of goods to the value of \$100. The glass was cut with a diamond, and the pieces taken away. While the thief was at his work customers were passing in and out of the store.

A number of Cuban ladies in this city have formed a society for the purpose of raising funds to procure necessities for the hospital service of the patriot army in Cuba, during the continuance of the present struggle. The Committee of Management consists of a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Vice-Secretary, and Treasurer, all daughters of Cuba.

Legal proceedings have been instituted by the Harbor Commissioners against the Erie Railway Company, on the charge that they are extending their bulkhead line in the North River, between Chambers and Reade sts., 19 feet beyond the proper mark, and widening their wharf 10 feet beyond the limit accorded by law.

The American Pomological Society is now holding its annual meeting at the Astor House. The principal business thus far is a revision of the fruit list hitherto recommended. On Wednesday evening, at an informal meeting of the members, it was decided not to recommend that new horticultural productions be protected by letters patent.

The *Boletin de la Revolucion* is the title of a Spanish paper now being published in this city, in the interests of the insurrectionary movement in Cuba. It is a small sheet, intended principally for the Cubans in this city, the number of whom has greatly increased of late, in consequence of the present trouble in the island. The paper appears once a week, and gives a full summary of the latest Cuban news, accompanied by spirited editorial comments.
