FITTING OUT OF CUBAN EXPEDITIONS FORBIDDEN IN SAN DOMINGO—THE CUBANS IN THE CIENFUEGOS SAID TO BE SURROUNDED BY THE SPANISH TROOPS.

HAVANA, March 29.—In the outskirts of Cardenas last Saturday night a patrol was fired upon. The fire was returned, and two Cubans were killed, and one was taken prisoner severely wounded. President Baez of St. Domingo has refused to allow the organization of expeditions in aid of the Cuban rebels. The *Diario* publishes the following news from the interior: In the Cienfuegos district the Government troops have completely surrounded the rebel forces under Gen. Ballon at La Valladora. Gen. Buccia, with 3,000 regulars, left Cienfuegos yesterday to attack the insurgents in the mountains near Siguanca. He expects to effect a junction near that point with a column advancing from Trinidad under Gen. Escalante.

DEFEAT OF THE CUBANS NEAR TRINIDAD—CAPTURE OF A BRITISH VESSEL BY THE SPANIARDS—THE PERUVIAN MONITOR.

A large party of insurgents were defeated on Saturday, near Trinidad. Telegraphic communication with Cienfuegos was restored on Sunday. Troops were arriving there, and departing for the interior. A detachment of 1,200 troops arrived at Santa Cruz on the 30th inst. from Puerto Principe for supplies. They were to return on the next day. Advice from Nassau to the 23d have been received. A Spanish man-of-war had captured the British ship *Jeff Davis*, which was returning with a cargo of sponge, and had also boarded and searched the schooner *Britannia*. One of the Peruvian monitors still remained at Ragged Island, waiting for supplies of coal from Nassau.
