

The action of Peru gives hope to the Cubans that other Spanish-American Republics will follow her example, and that her iron-clads will at no late day be made available for liberty. Information received by the patriot authorities here is to the effect that free communication exists between the four newly-constituted departments of their Republic; that their Constitution guarantees equal rights to all men, and that their cause was never so promising, or that of their oppressors more cruel and desperate. From Washington we hear that four expeditions of aid have successfully landed on the coast of Cuba. Havana telegrams report a battle at Puerto Padre, the massing of the insurgents at Las Tunas, and the taking of several guns from the Nipe filibusters.
