EFFECT OF THE FOURTEENTH AMENDMENT ON CONGRESSIONAL REPRESENTATION — ARRIVAL OF EX-MINISTER JAMES WATSON WFBB — HIS COURSE INDORSED BY THE PRESIDENT—NO DISPATCHES FROM MINISTER M'MAHON—GREAT PRESSURE OF PUBLIC BUSINESS—THE PRESIDENT'S SUMMER TRIP TO BE ABANDONED—VISITORS AT THE WHITE HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, Tuesday, June 22, 1863.

Mr. Jose Morales Lemus, the Envoy of the Cuban Government to Washington, who was one of the Cubans arrested and indicted in New York recently, arrived here yesterday, in company with two or three prominent partisans of the Cuban cause. His mission here is to present to the Secretary of State his credentials from Céspedes, and a copy of the Constitution adopted by the Cuban General Assembly. In consequence of the prolonged Cabinet meeting, and the general press of business on account of the long absence of the President, the Minister had no opportunity to-day to present his case.

Gen. Sickles arrived here this morning, for the purpose of receiving his instructions, preparatory to his departure for Madrid early in July. He had a long interview with Secretary Fish, and accompanied that gentleman to the executive mansion, where the Cabinet was in session. Mr. Fish had prepared instructions, and presented the same to the Cabinet for consideration. No one has yet been selected for the position of Secretary of Legation. An effort is being made to have Mr. Ferry retained.
