## THE CUBAN INSURRECTION.

The Insurgents in Magna Commanded by an

Ex-Confederate-Buttles in the Interior.

HAVANA, March 16 -The insurgents in the neighborhood of Sagua number fitteen hundred, under command of an American named Rudolph Pole, formally in the Confederate service, and lately a clerk in the mercantile house of Bishop, in Caibarien

Advices from the interior represent the troops advancing against the rebels in every direction.

The government officers are working hard to reestablish communication between Nuevitas and

Puerto Principe.

Skirmishes have taken place at Boca, near Nuevitas, and two fights within forty eight hours are reported, in one of which, according to the government account, one hundred and seventy five rebels were killed. No reports of these engagements had been received from the Cuban side.

Forty rebel prisoners have arrived herefrom Re-

medios.

The rebels defeated at Mayari, are moving towards Holgulu

The Diario says the wealthy planters and merchants are dissatisfied with the abolition proclamation issued by the insurgents in the Central Department.
