proclamation as follows: Slavery brought to Cuba
by Spanish domination eught to be extinguished

indemnification; third, freedmen to bear arms;
fourth, freedmen to have the rights and privileges of
white men; fifth, all patriots, whatever their color,
are under the same obligations to the cause. The

REPORTED BATTLE IN CUBA.

HAVANA, March 14.—Official despatches report a battle at Mayari, the headquarters of the insurgents in the Eastern department. The official account states that a column of 500 regular troops, supported by a heavy artillery mr., carried the fortifications of Mayari and captured the town, which was defended by 2,000 insurgents. No rebel version of the affair has been rece ved.
