HAVANA, June 26.

The marines are now guarding forts Moro and Cabanas, the volunteers disavowing any intention to resist Derodas having retired.

Eight hundred Spaniards defeated and lost convoy at Las Tunas.

The Spaniards at Cinco Villas and Las Tunas are calling for reinforcements.—Gen. Pueblo says 5,000 men are required in Cinco Villas district.

Heavy fighting again. Saluave's defeat with heavy loss is reported.

Luperos landed at Puente Plata, San Domingo, and demanded its surrender.

The port of Maracaiby in Venezuela is closed.

Gen. Buceta, falsely reported to have been killed by his troops, has gone to New Orleans.

The cholera has broken out in Guaxasma and vicinity. Several cases are also reported in Santiago. The disease was raging with great severity in the interior about the last of May.

HAVANA, June 26.—The Schooner Grapeshot landed forty men and a portion of her cargo on the Cuban coast; while the boats were landing, some passengers on board attempted to run the vessel ashore, a fight ensued with the crew and officers, in which the Captain of the Grapeshot received a bullet in the leg.

The Schooner finally got rid of the whole party, and without landing all her stores, proceeded to Yorks Island, where she received clearance and arrived on the 4th inst., at Falmouth.

JAMAICA, June 25.

There were 155 packages of arms and ammunition remaining on board, and were seized by the custom officers. The Captain abandoned the vessel. The seizure was subsequently declared illegal and the Captain sued the Collector of the Port and others for damages.

Several fillibusters who landed at Battigaseri were executed at Santiago.

The volunteer forces have, of their own free will, given up the duty of garisoning Moro Castle and fortress Cabanas, and will be relieved to-morrow by naval forces.—They have taken this action to convince the home Government that they have no idea of disobeying its orders or opposing the new Captain General.
