WASHINGTON, June 4.

Ordinance for the indiscriminate admission to places of amusement passed both branches of the city council.

Bricklayers at the navy yard resolved to strike unless two colored men recently appointed, were withdrawn.

NEW YORK, June 4.—Steamer Moro Castle arrived and reports on outward trip, when off Cardenas, a Spanish war steamer fired two blank shots at her. The Moro Castle being over due at Havana, proceeded on her way, when the Spaniard fired a shell, which fell astern.

LONDON, June 4. — The Standard in a leading editorial believes America does not wish war. Moeley's assurances are well timed and appropriate.

HAVANA, June 4.—The landing of filibusters causes a depression in business.

The steamer Montezuma met a schooner which had just landed munitions in the neighborhood of the bay of Nipe.

There was a fight near Villaclara between twelve hundred insurgents and the troops. Passengers report only three Spaniards escaped.

Nelson sailed for Vera Cruz to-day.

The filibusters recently landed at Bay of Nipe, marched to the interior, abandoning four guns for want of transportation.

NEW ORLEANS, June 4.—A submarine driver named Robert Spencer, was drowned at Southwest Pass to-day.

HAVANA, June 2.—Genl. Peluez whose life was threatened by volunteers went to Cienfuegos where the volunteers refused him landing. He returned to Havana where the volunteers demanded his life because he has sold his country, asserting that he had received \$120,000 to allow rebels to escape. A compromise was ultimately effected. Yesterday evening the volunteers greatly excited assembled before Dulces palace shouting death to Dulce, death to Peluez. This morning a committee of volunteers entered the palace and demanded Dulce's immediate resignation, declaring he was allied with traitors.

His resignation was soon promulgated, no violence committed.

The volunteers have full control and are really the governing power of the Island.

Several military and civil officers of high rank, accused of connivance with the rebels, will be immediately relieved.

The insurgents in several of the recent engagements, gained a slight advantage over the Spanish troops.

The third volunteers in Matanzas, assembled before the Governor's Palace at that place and demanded his immediate resignation as Governor of Matanzas. The demand was successful, and Colonel Leon is now acting Governor.

No outrages were committed, and the city is quiet, but anxiety is intense.

A Spanish steamer will carry Dulce to Spain.
