

The War in Cuba.

New York, August 6.—Havana letters give from a Spanish standpoint an account of a rebel assault on Puerto Principe and its repulse. The latest mail of vices state that the ill fortune of the insurgents continued. The forces of Jordan, Marmol, Marceno and Figueroa attacked simultaneously Spanish detachments on the estate of Lacin, Santo Sideo, San Jose and Santa Isabel, also those of Palo, Soriano, Valgo, but were driven back at all points.

New York, August 6.—It was stated last evening that Judge Pierpont, the President and Secretary Fish had a private interview, and resolved, owing to the lateness of the hour, and the fact that the Judge had received from the Spanish authorities some Spanish correspondence which had not been translated with reference to the late seizure of gunboats, to postpone the conference until this morning at 10 o'clock. It is said by those interested, that matters of the utmost importance were then to be discussed, and that the conference would extend over several hours.
