

The steamer *Germania* of one of the lines between New York and Europe, went ashore on the morning of the 7th inst., on the rocks in Seal's Cove, Trepassey Bay, Newfoundland. Her passengers had barely time to save their lives. The steamer *Cleopatra* also struck on the rocks in the same bay within about four miles of the *Germania*, on the same morning, and made a total wreck. Her passengers also escaped with life. A dense fog had prevailed around Newfoundland for several days.—A submarine cable from Canada by way of Greenland, Iceland, and the Faroe Isles to Northern Europe is talked of, and steps are taking to organize a company for its construction.—From all accounts sickness is making sad havoc with both sides in the Cuban insurrection. One account states that the insurgents suffer most from want of medicine and medical attendance. The Spaniards have captured a rebel convoy, Gen. Jourdan commanding, which is considered the "fattest take" of the war, thus far. The authorities of Santo Espiritu report the discovery of a rebel plot to poison the bread used by the inhabitants. The slaves are said to be largely joining the Cubans, and make good soldiers.—Minister McMahon has arrived at Rosario. He left Lopez's headquarters on the 24th June, and was accompanied to the Brazilian lines by a son of Lopez, and an escort. The late American minister has left, and Mr. Kirk presented his credentials in his place. The rebellion in Uruguay is ended.
