Aid for the Cubans-Another Expedition.

A detective in the employ of the Spanish Government states that the steamer Hornet is now lying off the New-Jersey shore, at a point between Jersey City and Hoboken, nearly opposite Pier No. 41 North River, and will depart within twenty-four hours to give aid and comfort to the Cuban revolutionists.

It is further stated that she has mattresses, pans and pannikins on board sufficient to meet the wants of at least 250 men, 250 tons of coal, a galley of sufficient capacity to cook for the number of men mentioned, and a lot of rough lumber for the construction of berths for their accommodation.

It is further stated that no effort will be made to prevent her departure, as she will, doubtless, clear for some South American port, and there is no positive proof of her intention to violate the Neutrality laws.

The detective further states that she is now under \$50,000 bonds, on which Senator Chandler, of Michigan, and Hon. Benjamin F. Butler are sureties, not to violate the Neutrality laws; but the detective gives it as his belief that she will run into Curacoa, one of the Dutch West India Islands, where it is said the authorities wink at such transactions, and transfer the "passengers" to another vessel, which will endeavor to land them in Cuba.
