LATE MAIL NEWS FROM THE ISLAND.

By the arrival of the Juniata at Philadelphia, and the receipt of her mails in this City at 1½ A. M. today, our Havana correspondent's letter, dated April 12, is at hand. No events of importance had occurred since he last wrote. Concerning Rodas' movements he writes: "The Captain-General appears to have things his own way in the vicinity of Puerto Principe. His telegrams and letters are of the most cheering character for the Spanish cause. They resemble much, it is true, the Crockett story about the History does not state whether the coon did come down or not, and here the resemblance between CROCKETT'S coon and the Captain-General's telegrams becomes still more striking, history not having informed us yet whether or no everything turned out exactly as the Captain-General informs us it did. The telegrams consist usually of reports as statefrom different parties, and menta most all are couched in such peculiar phraseology that the Captain-General could not be accused of having willfully misled public opinion should the future fail to warrant the statements of the present." Though a uniform couleur de rose, let us add that they present no intelligence of vital importance.
