The Reported Revolt of the Spanish Volunteers—Dapture of the Morro Castle Doubtful—Why Gen. Fordan Left.

Washington, May 2.—The Government has, up to this morning, received no official dispatches in the least degree confirming or strengthening the report that volunteers have seized. Morro Castle, as recently reported. There is no doubt, however, the volunteers control to a great degree the Spanish authorities. A prominent friend of Cuban independence says the reason why Gen. Jordan left the Cuban army is that he had engaged in that service for only one year, which time has expired; but he is now on his way to this country, accompanied by two secretaries, as an accredited agent of the insurgents.

Spanish Accounts of Operations on the Island—Another Order to Surrender Issued by De Rodas.

HAVANA, May 2.—The following reports of the situation in the interior come from Spanish sources:

"The insurgents in the Camaguey District continue to present themselves in large numbers to receive pardon. The resignation of the rebel Gen. AGRAMONTE is confirmed. The rebels have abolished the rank of General-in-Chief, and appointed Frederic Cavada Chief of Operations, and Bembita Commanding-General in the Cinco Villas District. Fifteen Spanish soldiers captured last June by the rebels have just arrived at Puerto Principe. They were threatened with death by Quesada, but their lives were saved through the intercession of Bembita, with whom they served up to the time of their release. The rebel President Cespedes is roaming about the coast, never sleeping twice in the same place. The disloyal Prefect Betancour, alias Barbazo, and the Sub-Prefect Rafeti have been captured and executed at Puerto Principe. The gun-boat Soldado recently captured a small boat at La Guajata Key. In the boat were found a passport issued to Gen. Goicouria and his commission as Ambassador to Mexico, both signed by Cespedes. Other gun-boats coming up the key were surrounded. A search will be made, and if Goicouria is on the island, he cannot escape. Many insurgents have been killed at Alvaiez, and near Santo Espiritu, by the volunteers."

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Capt.-Gen. DE RODAS has issued an order requiring all persons residing in the insurrectionary district to come to the nearest settlement or town within the next thirty days; and threatening that, should they neglect to do so, if captured they will be treated as rebels. This order causes much excitement, and is considered a heavy

blow to the insurgent cause.
