THE GREENWALTH MURDER IN HAVANA.—
The Secretary of State has sent in some additional correspondence relative to the murder of Greenwalth and the attempted murder of three Americans in Havans by the volunteers.

The facts in the case are very succinctly

stated by the French Consul General, who saw part of the shooting and remonstrated with two of the murderers. A portion of the correspondence is devoted mainly to showing that Greenwalth, although a resident of New York and on business in Havana for a New York house, was not a citizen of the United States, but of North Germany. Mr. Fish may he anxious to take advantage of this fact to tide over any trouble with the Spanish authorities on account of the murder. He may consider it 2 lucky providence which allotted death to Greenwalth and gave only wounds to our bona fide citizens. He may even consider it a

great stroke of luck that Greenwalth delayed getting out his naturalization papers, but the people and common sense demand some security for our citizens now in Cuba and reparation and yangeance for those wounded and

killed.
