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# CITY CHARTER.

AN ACT TO AMEND THE SEVERAL ACTS INCORPORATING THE CITY OF COLUMBUS.

SEC. 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio.* That so much of the County of Franklin as is comprised within the following limits, to wit: Beginning at a point where the south-west corner of the New Penitentiary lot bounds on the Scioto river, thence north with the west line of said lot to the north side of North Public Lane, (if extended,) thence east with Public Lane to the east side of the Harbor road, (so called,) then Northward with said Harbor road, to the old Alum creek road, thence eastward with the south line of said road to a point in range with the east line of East Public Lane, and from thence southward to, and with the east line of said East Public Lane to the Licking river, and, crossing the same continue with the west line of the New Turnpike road to the south-east corner of Bryden's plat of out-lots; thence west, on the south line of said out-lots and the south line of the Poor House lot on to the north-east corner of a five acre lot owned by M. J. Gilbert, recently sold out in small building lots; thence southward with the east line of said five acre lot, to the south-east corner thereof; thence west with the south line thereof to the east line of Yager's addition; thence south, on his east line, to the south-east corner of his last addition; then westward, with the south line of the said last addition, to the west side of the Chil-

licothe road; thence northward, with the west line of said road, to the south line of South Columbus; thence west with said line and the course thereof, till it crosses the Columbus Feeder; (Canal,) so as to include the tow path; thence northward with said tow path to the Scioto river, and in the same direction across said river; thence up said river, with its meanders, to a point from which a line drawn due north will strike the place of beginning— shall be and is hereby declared to be a City; and the inhabitants thereof are created a body corporate and politic, with perpetual succession, by the name and style of the "City of Columbus," and, as such, by that name shall be capable of contracting, and being contracted with, of suing and being sued, pleading and being impleaded, answering and being answered unto, in all courts and places, and in all matters whatsoever; and also, of purchasing, using, occupying, enjoying and conveying real and personal estate; and may have and use a corporate seal, and change, alter and renew the same at pleasure; and shall be competent to have, receive and enjoy, all the rights, immunities, powers and privileges, and be subject to all the duties and obligations incumbent upon and appertaining to a municipal corporation. *Provided*, that all grounds that now are, or hereafter may be laid out into lots as additions to said city, whether so named or not, if contiguous thereto and designed or used as building lots, may, by the City Council, by ordinance passed for that purpose, be included in and made a part of said City, as effectually as if embraced in the foregoing limits.

*Sec. 2.* That the exercise of the powers hereby granted to the said city, and the administration of the fiscal and muni-

cipal affairs of the same, shall be vested in one principal officer, to be styled the Mayor, and in a City Council, composed of three members from each of the wards of said city, who shall be residents of their respective wards, together with such other officers as hereafter mentioned, and provided for; and the said City of Columbus shall be and is hereby invested as the lawful owner and proprietor with all the real and personal estate, and all the rights and privileges thereof, together with all the property, funds and revenues and all money, debts, accounts and demands, due and otherwise owing, or belonging to said city, under any former charter or organization, or which by or under the authority of any former acts, ordinances, grants, donations, gifts or purchases have been acquired, vested in or are or may be owing or belonging to the said city, under any former charter or organization, as aforesaid, and the same are hereby transferred to the corporate body created and established by this act; and all suits pending and judgments recovered by, in favor or against the said city under any such former charter or organization, together with all rights, interests, claims and demands in favor of and against the same, may be continued, prosecuted, defended and collected, in the same manner as though this act had never been passed, and the said city shall be held accountable, made liable for all debts and liabilities of the said city under any former charter or organization as aforesaid.

*Sec. 3.* That the said city shall be divided, as at present, into five wards, the boundaries whereof shall remain as now fixed by ordinance: *Provided*, that the said City Council may at any time create additional wards, and the

boundaries thereof, and of those now established, alter in such manner as they may deem expedient.

Sec. 4. That the requisite qualifications of a voter under this charter shall be the same as is, now, or hereafter may be required by the laws of this State to constitute a legal voter for state and county officers. No one shall be eligible to the office of Mayor, Marshal, Treasurer or Councilman, unless he possesses the qualifications of a voter, and has been a resident of the city one year next preceding his election.

Sec. 5. That the Mayor of said city shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof on the second Monday of April, annually, and shall hold his office for the term of one year, and until his successor shall be chosen and qualified—it shall be his duty to be vigilant and active at all times in causing the laws and ordinances of said city to be put in force and duly executed, to inspect the conduct of all subordinate officers in the government thereof, and, as far as in his power, to cause all negligence, carelessness and positive violation of duty to be prosecuted and promptly punished; he shall keep the seal of said city, sign all commissions, licenses and permits which may be granted by or under the authority of the City Council, and shall keep an office in some convenient place in said city; he shall perform such duties and exercise such power as from time to time may devolve upon him by the ordinances of said city, not inconsistent with the provisions of this act and the character and dignity of his office, and generally do and perform all such duties and exercise such other powers as pertain to the office of Mayor; he shall in his judicial capacity have exclusive original juris-

diction of all cases for the violation of the ordinances of said city, and in all other cases he is hereby vested with powers coequal with Justices of the Peace within said city, and shall have power to exercise the same jurisdiction and authority in civil and criminal cases within the limits of said city, and shall be entitled to the same fees, as Justices of the Peace in like cases; *Provided*, That in all cases brought before said Mayor, for violations of the ordinances of said city, and where said Mayor shall adjudge the defendant or defendants to pay a fine of five dollars and upwards, exclusive of costs, the defendant or defendants shall have the right of appealing from the said judgment to the Court of Common Pleas of Franklin county, upon giving bond in double the amount of said judgment and costs, and with such security as shall be approved of by said Mayor, within ten days after the rendition of said judgment, which bond shall be conditioned to pay and discharge the judgment and costs; which may be recovered against him, her or them, in the said Court of Common Pleas; which appeal, when perfected by giving bond as aforesaid, shall entitle the party appealing to the same rights and privileges, subject to the same conditions, restrictions and limitations, as by the laws of this State, pertain to parties appealing from the judgments of Justices of the Peace to the Court of Common Pleas: and the said causes so appealed, shall be prosecuted in the said Court of Common Pleas by indictment and trial by jury, in the same manner as offences against the laws of the State are prosecuted; and it shall be sufficient to set forth in the indictment the offence in the words of the ordinance said to be violated, and to refer to said ordinance by title only.

without reciting such ordinance, and by concluding the said indictment; against the peace and dignity of the State of Ohio: and the said Court of Common Pleas of Franklin county is hereby authorized, empowred and directed to take cognizance of, and hear and determine all such cases as shall be brought before them by appeal as aforesaid, and assess such fine and pass judgment against such defendant or defendants, as shall be prescribed by the ordinances of the city: the Mayor shall moreover, have authority to take and certify the acknowledgments of all deeds for the conveyance or encumberance of real estate situate in the state of Ohio; and it shall be lawful for him to order any person brought before him charged with the commission of any criminal offence in any State or Territory of the United States, upon proof adjudged by him sufficient, to direct such accused person to be delivered to some suitable person or persons, to be conveyed to the proper jurisdiction for trial. He shall, at the first regular meeting of the City Council after the spring election of each year, and at such other times as he may deem proper, report to the said City Council the state of the municipal affairs of said city, and recommend the adoption of such measures as to him may seem expedient.

Sec. 6. That there shall be elected annually by the qualified voters of said City, a city Marshal, who shall hold his office for one year, and until his successor be elected and qualified, who shall perform such duties and exercise such powers not herein specified as may be lawfully required of him by the ordinances of said city, and shall receive such fees and compensation as the said City Council shall direct; the said Marshal shall execute and return

all writs and other process directed to him by the Mayor, and when necessary in criminal cases, or for violations of the city ordinances, may serve the same in any part of Franklin County; it shall be his duty to suppress all riots, disturbances and breaches of the peace, to apprehend all rioters and disorderly persons and disturbers of the public peace in said city, and all persons in the act of committing any indictable offence against the laws of this State or ordinances of said city, or fleeing from justice after having committed any such offence, and him, her or them forthwith to take into custody and bring before the Mayor for examination; and, in case of resistance, may call to his aid and command the assistance of all bystanders and others in the vicinity; he shall have power, with the approbation of the City Council, to appoint one or more deputies, and at pleasure to dismiss and discharge them from office, and shall in all things be responsible for the correct and faithful discharge of their duties, and liable for all negligence, carelessness and misconduct in office, and positive violations of duty, which they or either of them may be guilty of in the performance of their official duties. He shall have the same power in the city to serve writs issued by the Mayor under the State Laws, that Constables have to serve similar writs issued by Justices of the Peace, and shall be entitled to the same fees therefor.

Sec. 7. The City Treasurer shall be elected at the same time, in the same manner, and for the same period of time as the Mayor; he shall give bond with security, to the city, to be approved by the City Council, before entering on the duties of his office, conditioned for the

faithful discharge of his duties as such Treasurer; he shall pay over all money by him received to the order of the President of the City Council, countersigned by the City Clerk, but no money shall be drawn from the Treasury but by appropriations made by the City Council; and the Treasurer shall, when required, submit his books and vouchers to their inspection, and shall perform such duties, and exercise such powers as may be lawfully required of him, by the ordinances of said city, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by ordinance.

SEC. 8. That the members of the City Council shall also be elected on the second Monday of April in each year, by the qualified voters of their respective wards, in the following manner, to wit: one member from each ward shall be elected yearly who shall hold his office three years and until his successor is elected and qualified, so that one third of them will go out of office every year; and the first election under this charter shall in no wise affect the rights, and privileges of those holding offices under the old charter, and whenever any vacancy may occur from any cause, such vacancy shall be filled by a vote of the said City Council from the ward in which such vacancy may occur, which appointment shall continue until the next succeeding annual election for city officers, when such vacancy shall be filled for the remainder of the term by the qualified voters of the proper ward as in other cases of election of members of the City Council.

SEC. 9. The members so elected shall, when assembled together and duly organized, constitute the City Council,

a majority of the whole number of whom shall be necessary to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; they shall be the judges of the elections and qualifications of their own members, and shall determine the rules of their proceedings, and keep a journal thereof, which shall be open to the inspection and examination of every citizen, and may compel the attendance of absent members in such manner and under such penalties as they shall think fit to prescribe; they shall meet in the Council Chamber or in some other convenient place in said city, on the third Monday in April, and after having taken the oath of office before the Mayor, or some other officer qualified to administer oaths, they shall elect from their own body a President, who shall preside in their meetings for one year, and a City Clerk, who shall not be required to be a member of said City Council, who shall hold his office for one year and until his successor is elected and qualified.

SEC. 10. That said City Council shall provide the places and fix the times of holding their meetings, not herein otherwise provided for, which shall at all times be open for the public; they shall appoint all City Surveyors, Clerks of the Market, Street Commissioners, Health Officers, Weighers of Hay, Measurers of Wood, Coal and Lime, Wharf Masters, and may appoint a City Attorney, and all other city officers (not herein otherwise provided for,) as shall be necessary for the good government of said city, and the due exercise of its corporate powers, and which shall have been provided for by ordinance; and all city officers whose term of service is not prescribed, and whose powers and duties

are not defined in and by this act, shall perform such duties, exercise such powers and continue in office for such term of time, not exceeding one year, as shall be prescribed by ordinance: *Provided*, however, that the said City Council may at any time, when deemed expedient by them, provide by ordinance for the election of any of said officers by the qualified voters of the said city or wards, as the case may require.

SEC. 11. That the said City Council shall have the custody, care, superintendance, management and control of all the real and personal estate, and other corporate property belonging to said city, and all the real and personal estate, money funds and revenues which, from time to time, may be owned by, or of right belong to said city, with full power to purchase, hold, possess, use, occupy, sell and convey the same for the use and benefit of said city, and the inhabitants thereof: *Provided*, that the City Council shall not have power to sell any public landing, wharf or wharves, dock or docks, basin or basins, or any interest therein, or part thereof, which now is or hereafter may be used and kept for the accommodation and convenience of the merchants and others engaged in the trade, commerce and navigation of said city; nor shall the said City Council issue any printed notes or tickets to be issued under their authority, or under the authority of said city, as a circulating medium of trade or exchange, or in any way or manner, either directly or indirectly, engage in the business of banking.

SEC. 12. That the City Council shall have power, and it is hereby made their duty, to make and publish, from time to time, all such ordinances as shall be necessary to secure

said city and the inhabitants thereof against injuries from fire, thieves, robbers, burglars, and all other persons violating the public peace; for the suppression of riots, gambling, and indecent and disorderly conduct; for the punishment of all lewd and lascivious behavior in the streets and all other public places of said city, and for the apprehension and punishment of all vagrants and idle persons; they shall have power, from time to time, to make and publish all such laws and ordinances as to them shall seem necessary, to provide for the safety, preserve the health, promote the prosperity, and improve the morals, order, comfort, and convenience of said city and the inhabitants thereof; to impose fines, forfeitures and penalties on all persons offending against the laws and ordinances of said city, and provide for the prosecution, recovery and collection thereof; and shall have full power to regulate, by ordinances, the keeping and sale of gunpowder within the city.

SEC. 13. That the said City Council shall have power to establish a Board of Health for said city, invest it with such powers, and impose upon it such duties, as shall be necessary to secure said city and the inhabitants thereof from the evils, distress and calamities of every malignant and infectious disease, provide for its proper organization and the election or appointment of the necessary officers thereof, and make such by-laws, rules and regulations for its government and support as shall be required for enforcing the most prompt and efficient performance of its duties, and the lawful exercise of its powers; they shall have power whenever the public peace of said city shall require it to establish a city Watch and or-

ganize the same under the general superintendence of the City Marshal or other proper officer of the police, prescribe its duties, and define its powers in such manner as will most effectually preserve the peace of said city, secure the inhabitants thereof from personal violence, and their property from fire, and unlawful depredations; they shall establish and organize all such Fire Companies and provide them with the proper Engines, and other instruments as shall be necessary to extinguish fires, and preserve the property of the inhabitants of said city from conflagration, and provide such by-laws and regulations for the government of the same as they shall think fit and expedient; and each and every person who may belong to any such fire company, shall, during the time he may continue an acting member of such company, be exempted from the performance of military duty, in time of peace, from labor on the highways and from serving as a juror; *Provided*, that the privileges aforesaid shall not be extend to any but active duty members, furnished with all the apparatus or equipage necessary; and all other members who have become disabled from serving as Firemen while on the discharge of their duties as such, and any person who shall have been a member of any of the fire companies of said city, and shall have faithfully discharged his duties as such for the term of five years, shall be forever thereafter exempt from the performance of military duty in time of peace, from labor on the highways and from serving as a juror so long as such person shall remain a resident of said city of Columbus, or of the county of Franklin— and *provided*, that this said five years service shall not be construed to mean five consecutive years, but may con-

sist of different periods of service at different times, in all amounting to five years.

SEC. 14. That the said City Council shall establish and regulate the Markets, market places of said city for the sale of provisions, vegetables and other articles necessary for the sustenance, comfort and convenience of said city, and the inhabitants thereof, to assize and regulate the sale of bread, and they shall have power to establish and construct landing places, wharves, docks and basins in said city, at or on any of the city property.

SEC. 15. That for the purpose of more effectually securing said city from the destructive ravages of fire, the said City Council shall have power and authority by ordinance to designate such portions and parts of the city as they shall deem proper, within which no buildings of wood shall be erected, and to affix such penalty for a violation of said ordinance as they may deem proper, and every building erected contrary to such ordinance may be declared to be a public nuisance, and be abated and removed as such by the City Council, in such manner as they shall by ordinance prescribe.

SEC. 16. That the said City Council shall have power, and it is hereby made their duty to regulate, by good and wholesome laws and ordinances for that purpose, all taverns, ale and porter shops, and houses, and all saloons, public eating houses and confectionaries within said city, all theatrical exhibitions and public shows, and all exhibitions of whatever name or nature to which admission is obtained on the payment of money or any other reward; and all sales at auction in said city, except such as required by law of public officers, and impose reasonable fines

and penalties for the violation of any such laws and ordinances; and the said City Council shall have full and exclusive power to grant or refuse license to showmen, keepers and managers of theatrical exhibitions and all other exhibitions for money or reward, and auctioneers as aforesaid in said city, and in granting any such license it shall be lawful for said City Council to exact, demand and receive such sum or sums of money as they shall think fit and expedient, to annex thereto such reasonable terms and conditions in regard to time, place and other circumstances, under which such license shall be acted upon, and in their opinion the peace, quiet and good order of society in said city may require; and for the violation of such reasonable terms and conditions as aforesaid, the Mayor shall have power to revoke or suspend such license, whenever the good order and welfare of said city may require it, in such manner as shall be provided for by ordinance.

Sec. 17. That the said City Council shall have power, and they are hereby authorized to require and compel the abatement and removal of all nuisances within the limits of said city, under such regulations as shall be prescribed by ordinance; to cause all grounds therein, where water shall stand, time become stagnant, to be raised, filled up or drained; and to cause all putrid substances, whether animal or vegetable, to be removed; and to effect these objects the said City Council may, from time to time, give notice to the proprietor or proprietors, or to his or her agent, and to the non-resident proprietors, who have no agents therein, by a publication in one or more of the newspapers printed in said city; for the period of six weeks, of all or any ground subject at any time to be covered with

stagnant water, to fill up, raise or drain such grounds at their own expense; and the said City Council shall designate how high such grounds shall be filled up and raised, or in what manner they shall be drained, and fix some reasonable time for filling up, raising or draining the same; and if such proprietor or proprietors, or agent, shall refuse or neglect to fill up, raise or drain such grounds in such manner and within such time as the said City Council have designated and fixed, they shall cause the same to be done at the expense of the city, and assess the amount of the expense thereof on the lot or lots of ground so filled up, raised or drained as aforesaid, and cause the assessment with an additional ten per cent. thereon so made as aforesaid, to be certified to the Auditor of Franklin county, and by him it shall be charged against such lot or lots or other grounds, on the tax duplicate of Franklin county, and the County Treasurer of said county or other collector of taxes shall collect the same with, and as the other taxes that may be charged against such lot or lots or other grounds are collected, and if necessary to make sale of any such lot or lots or other grounds for the payment of such assessment and taxes, the same shall be conducted in all respects as is or may be required by law in other cases, for the sale of delinquent lands for taxes.

Sec. 18. That said City Council shall cause the streets, lanes, alleys and commons of said city to be kept open and in-repair, and free from all kinds of nuisances; but it shall be lawful for them to continue any building or erection now standing thereon, if in their opinion the interests and general health of said city will not be injured thereby; they shall have the exclusive power of appoint-

ing supervisors and other officers of streets within the said city; and all labor required by law of residents of the city, and all road tax collected from property within said city, shall be expended within the same; in such manner as the Council may direct; they shall have the power, whenever the public convenience or safety shall require it, to prohibit hogs, cattle, horses, and other description of animals, from running at large in the streets, lanes, alleys, commons, and other public places in said city; they shall have power to license and regulate all carts, wagons, drays and every description of two and four wheeled carriages which may be kept in said city for hire; all livery stables, brokers and loan officers; and to provide for the inspection and the appointment of inspectors of all articles of domestic growth, produce or manufacture, which may be brought to said city, or sold or purchased therein, for exportation, and not included in the inspection laws of the State.

Sec. 19. That to defray the current expenses of said city, the said City Council shall annually determine on the amount of tax to be raised for ordinary city purposes, and for such other and particular

special purpose that they are or may be authorized by law to collect taxes for, and shall certify the same to the County Auditor of Franklin county on or before the fifteenth of June in each year, and in their said certificate to said County Auditor, and on the record of their proceedings, they shall specify the amount required for each purpose, which shall be by him placed upon the duplicate and be collected by the County Treasurer as other taxes are collected: *Provided*, however, that the aggregate amount so

to be levied for any one year shall not exceed a tax of five mills on the dollar of the taxable property in said city: and provided, further, that the City Council shall have power whenever in their opinion the interests of the city shall require it, to levy a tax upon dogs and such other domestic animals as are not included in the list of taxable property on the grand levy of the State, and provide by ordinance for the collection hereof, or they may, in such other manner as they think proper, prohibit the keeping of dogs and such other animals within said city; and they shall have power, on the petition of the owners of two-thirds in value of the real estate on both sides of any street in said city, and extending along the same a distance equal to at least half a square, excepting in cases where public property or property out of the limits of said city may bound on one side of the street, and in such case of two-third of the owners in value as aforesaid of those owning property on the one side, to levy and collect a special tax on the real estate bounded on or within the same for the purpose of lighting with gas or otherwise such place so petitioned for, and provide for the collection of the same.

Sec. 20. That the said City Council shall have power, whenever the public good shall require it, to erect a City Prison, and to regulate the police or internal government of the same; that said prison may contain cells for solitary confinement, and such apartments as may be necessary for the safe-keeping, accommodation and employment of all such persons as may be confined therein; that the said City Council shall have power to pass all such ordinances as may be necessary for the apprehension and punishment

of all common street beggars, common prostitutes, and persons disturbing the peace of said city, who, upon conviction thereof before the Mayor, in such manner as the said City Council shall prescribe, may be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars, or be confined in the cells, or be kept at hard labor within the bounds of said city for any length of time not exceeding fifteen days; that any person, convicted before the Mayor under the provisions of this act, of any offence which, by the laws of the State of Ohio, is punishable, in whole or in part, by confinement in the county jail, may be confined in the city prison or county jail, at the discretion of the Mayor, for any time not exceeding that specified by the laws of this State for the punishment of such offence, or such person so convicted as aforesaid, may be kept at hard labor within the bounds of said city for the said term of their sentence: and provided, also, that until such City Prison shall be prepared for the reception of prisoners, the said city shall be allowed the use of the county jail of Franklin county, for the confinement of all such persons as may be convicted before the Mayor, and who shall be liable to punishment under the laws of this state, or the ordinances of said city; and all persons so imprisoned shall be under the charge of the Sheriff of said county, who shall receive and discharge such persons in and from said jail, in such manner as shall be prescribed by the ordinances of said city or otherwise, by due course of law; and after the said City Prison shall be erected and prepared for the reception of prisoners, the Marshal of said city, in the control, government and management therent, shall have the same power and authority, and be subject to the same

liabilities, as by the laws of this State now are, or hereafter may be, conferred and imposed upon the Sheriffs of the several counties in the control, government and management of the county jails, and all such other powers and duties as the City Council may prescribe, to enforce any sentence of hard labor pronounced against any person by the said Mayor.

SEC. 21. That all money's raised, recovered, received, or collected by means of any tax, license, penalty, fine, forfeiture, or otherwise, under the authority of this act, or which may belong to said city, shall be paid into the City Treasury, and shall not be drawn therefrom, except by order or under the authority of the City Council; and it shall be the duty of said City Council to liquidate and settle all claims and demands against said city; and to require all officers, agents, or other persons entrusted with the disbursement or expenditure of the public money, to account to them therefor at such time, and in such manner, as they may direct; and they shall annually publish, for the information of the citizens, a particular statement of the receipts and expenditures of all public money belonging to said city, and also of all debts due and owing to and from the same; and the said City Council shall have power to pass all such laws and ordinances as may be necessary and proper to carry into effect the powers herein and by this act granted.

SEC. 22. That said City Council shall have power, on the petition of the owners of two-thirds the appraised value of any real estate in any block or blocks, square or squares, or fractional squares in said city, to provide by ordinance for paying the side walks and gutters, changing

the grade and relaying the pavement and gutter, or for widening the pavement in front of or adjoining said real estate so petitioned for, in such manner and by such time as shall be specified in said ordinance; and in case the pavement of said sidewalk and gutters, so required to be made as aforesaid, shall not have been made in the manner and by the time prescribed in said ordinance, they shall cause the same to be done by the city, and assess the amount of the expense thereof on the real estate so paved in front of or adjoining, as aforesaid, and cause the said assessment so made as aforesaid, together with an additional ten per centum thereon, to be certified to the Auditor of Franklin county, and by him it shall be charged against such real estate on the tax duplicate of Franklin County; and the County Treasurer of said county, or other collector of taxes, shall collect the same with and as the other taxes that may be charged against such real estate are collected, and if necessary to make sale of said real estate for the payment of such assessment and taxes, the same shall be conducted in all respects as is or may be required by law in other cases for the sale of delinquent lands for taxes, and the said County Treasurer is hereby prohibited from receiving any part of said assessment and taxes so made on said real estate, unless the whole amount shall be paid: *Provided*, that when the grade of any street, lane or alley has been or shall be materially varied from the natural surface, either by filling up or cutting down of the same, the said City Council may assess the extra expenses of grading and paving the side walks and gutters adjoining such filling up or cutting down, or such part of the extra expenses as they may deem right and proper,

upon all the real estate comprised within the space partitioned for, in such manner as they by ordinance or resolution, may provide; and the said City Council shall have power, without petition, to cause all pavements, side walks and gutters in said city, to be kept in good condition, and when necessary, to direct the owners of all real estate adjoining said pavements, side walks and gutters, aforesaid, to have the same repaired and re-laid in such manner and by such time as they shall see proper to order; and in case the same shall not be done in the manner and by the time prescribed in said order, they shall cause the same to be done by the city, and the expense thereof, with an additional ten per centum thereon, shall be assessed on the real estate adjoining said pavement, side walk and gutter, as aforesaid, and certified and collected in the same manner as is prescribed in this section for paving the side walks and gutters, on petition.

SEC. 23. That the said City Council shall have power, on the petition of the owners of two thirds in value of the real estate of any lot, square, or fractional square in said city, to lay out and establish new streets, lanes or alleys, through or across such lot, square or fractional square, or part thereof: *Provided*, notice of the presenting of such petition shall be given by publication thereof, in at least two of the newspapers published in said city, for four consecutive weeks prior to the presentation of such petition to the said City Council; and *Provided*, also, that if any person shall claim damages in consequence of the laying out of any such new street or alley, and shall file notice thereof in writing in the office of the City Clerk, within ten days after the ordinance for laying out said

street or alley shall have been passed, the City Council shall, at their next meeting, appoint three disinterested, judicious freeholders of said city, who shall, after having been sworn, assess the damage, if any, over and above the benefit to the property claimed to have been injured, and make return thereof in writing to the City Clerk, and any person or persons claiming damages aforesaid, who shall be aggrieved by the decision of said freeholders, may, within twenty days after the filing of the report of the said freeholders in the office of the City Clerk, aforesaid, appeal from their decision to the Court of Common Pleas of Franklin county, by filing in the Clerk's office of said county, certified copies of the ordinance passed relating thereto, together with the report of the appraisers, aforesaid, with notice thereto appended, and said court may, for good cause shown, order a new appraisement of said premises and which shall be final, and shall award costs according to equity; and the damages so found by the appraisers appointed by the said City Council, or awarded by the appraisers under the order of said Court of Common Pleas, shall be paid by the petitioners for said street or alley, and if the same thereto, or in default thereof, the ordinance for the laying out of such new street, or alley, shall be null and void.

SEC. 24. That the City Council, two-thirds of all the members concurring therein, shall have power to borrow money at a rate of interest not exceeding seven per cent. per annum, for the discharge and liquidation of any debt of the city, or for the purchase of fire engines, hose, and apparatus connected therewith, or for the improvement of the city, and to pledge for the payment of the interest and

repayment of the principal, the property and resources of the city in such manner and upon such terms and conditions as by an ordinance or resolution voted for by two-thirds of the whole Council may be prescribed.

SEC. 25. That in the passage of ordinances and the adoption of resolutions, the ordinary rules of legislative bodies shall be observed so far as to require that all bills be read on two several days: first on the day when introduced, then referred to a committee, and at the next meeting of the City Council, reported back; and read the second time, when the final vote shall be taken: *Provided*, that with the unanimous consent of the Council this rule may be dispensed with, and the bill read twice and passed on the day of its introduction; and on the final passage of any ordinance or resolution, any member may demand the *ayes and nays*, and when called for, and taken, the names of the members voting for and against the same shall be entered on the Journals of the Council, and it shall require a majority of the whole Council to concur on the passage of any ordinance. All ordinances passed by the City Council shall be signed by the President and attested by the City Clerk, and published in one or more of the newspapers printed in said city before they shall be of any force or validity; they shall also be recorded in a book provided for that purpose, signed by the President, attested by the Clerk, and carefully preserved.

SEC. 26. That it shall be the duty of the City Clerk to make and keep a just and true record of all and every law and ordinance made and established by the City Council, and all their proceedings in their corporate capacity, and the record so made shall at all times be open to the in-

spection of any elector of said city; and he shall perform such duties and exercise such powers as may be lawfully required of him by the ordinances of said city.

**SEC. 27.** That the Mayor, Councilmen, Marshal, Treasurer, City Clerk, and all other officers under the government of said city, shall, before entering on the duties of their respective offices, take an oath or affirmation to support the constitution of the United States and of this State, and faithfully and impartially to perform the several duties of the office to which they may be respectively elected or appointed; and, when required, shall give such bond to said city with good and sufficient security, in such sum or sums, and with such conditions thereto, as the City Council may from time to time direct, and in all cases not herein before provided for, shall respectively be allowed and receive such fees and compensations for their services, and be liable to such fines, penalties and forfeitures, for negligence, carelessness, misconduct in office, and positive violation of duty, as the said City Council shall by ordinance order and determine.

**SEC. 28.** That whenever the office of Mayor, Marshal, Treasurer, City Clerk, or other officer, in and by this act specified or provided for, shall become vacant by death, resignation removal from the city, or otherwise, it shall be the duty of the City Council, as soon as may be, to appoint some suitable person, having the requisite qualifications, to fill such vacancy; and the person so appointed shall continue in office during the remainder of the term for which his predecessor was elected or appointed; and in case of sickness or temporary absence of the Mayor, the President of the said City Council shall act as Mayor until the said City

Council shall appoint some suitable person to perform the duties of that office during such sickness or temporary absence, who shall be obeyed and respected accordingly: *Provided*, that no appointment shall be made by the City Council under this act of any officer or agent of said city, or to fill any vacancy thereof, without a concurrent vote of a majority of all the members.

**SEC. 29.** That in all elections for city officers not otherwise provided for, it shall be the duty of the Mayor to issue a proclamation to the qualified voters of said city, or to those of the respective wards, as the case may require, setting forth the time of such election, the place or places where the same shall be held, the officer or officers to be chosen; and cause proclamation to be published in two of the newspapers printed in said city, at least ten days previous to said election; and every such election shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten o'clock in the forenoon, and continue open until four o'clock in the afternoon, and shall in all things be conducted agreeably to the laws regulating township elections for the time being; and it shall be the duty of the judges of such elections in the several wards, within two days thereafter, to make and direct the return thereof to the President of the City Council, who shall, at the next meeting of the Council after any such election, open the returns which have been made to him as aforesaid, an abstract of which shall be placed on the Journal by the City Clerk, and the person or persons having the highest number of votes shall be declared duly elected; but if from any cause the qualified voters of said city, or of the respective wards, as the case may be, shall fail to effect any election, at the time, and

in the manner herein provided, the Mayor shall forthwith issue his proclamation for a second or other election, which in all things shall be notified, conducted, regulated and the returns thereof made, as in and by this act is prescribed and the person or persons who shall be chosen at any such second or any other election, shall hold his or their office until the next stated period for a choice of a successor or successors; and it shall be the duty of the President of the City Council, immediately to notify such person or persons as may be elected as aforesaid, of his or their election, by causing a written notice thereof to be served upon him or them, by the City Marshal, or his deputy; and every person so chosen or elected as aforesaid, shall, within ten days after being notified of his election, cause himself to be qualified to enter upon the duties of his office, and in default thereof, the office to which he shall have [been] elected, shall be deemed and considered in law to be vacant; and it shall be the duty of the City Council to provide the place or places of holding all elections in said city, for city, township, county and State officers, and to appoint clerks of said elections, having the qualifications of voters within their respective wards, and the members of the City Council (when not candidates) shall be the Judges of the respective warus.

SEC. 30. That this act shall be taken and received in all courts and by all judges, magistrates and other public officers, as a public act, and all printed copies of the same which shall be printed by or under the authority of the General Assembly, shall be admitted as good evidence thereof without any other proof whatever. That the act entitled "An Act to incorporate the City of Columbus, in

the State of Ohio," passed March 3d, 1834, and all amendatory acts thereto, and all acts and parts of acts contrary to the provisions of this act, so far as they relate to the City of Columbus, be and the same are hereby repealed: Provided, that all city ordinances now in force shall not be affected thereby: this act to take effect and be in force from and after the passage thereof.

## A BRIEF HISTORY OF COLUMBUS.

The Legislature during its session in 1810-11, held in Zanesville, in order to establish a more central and permanent seat of government, received proposals from various places offering inducements for the location of the seat of government at the points designated in the proposals. Among the number were the proposals of Lyne Starling, James Johnston, Alexander M'Laughlin and John Kerr, the alter proprietors of Columbus, for establishing it on the "High Bank of the Scioto River opposite Franklinton," which site was then covered with its native growth of timber.

The proposals of Starling and Company were accepted by an act of the Legislature, passed Feb. 14, 1812, and the proprietors, Lyne Starling, James Johnston, Alexander M'Laughlin and John Kerr, laid out the town in the spring following. The lots are 62 $\frac{1}{4}$  by 187 $\frac{1}{2}$  feet. The streets cross each other at right angles varying 12 degrees to the right of the cardinal points. High street running north 12 degrees east, crossing Broad street at the north-west corner of the Public Square, (the principal street,) is 100 feet wide, and extends from the northern to the southern limits of the city. Broad street, which runs east and west 12 degrees south, is 120 feet wide, and extends from the bridge on the National Road to the eastern limits of the city, passing the north side of the Pub-

On the 18th of June, 1812, the first public sale of lots at Auction commenced and continued three days. The lots sold were principally on High and Broad streets, and were generally struck off at from two hundred to a thousand dollars. The only cleared place at this time, within the limits of the town plat, was a small spot on Front street, a little north of State street, and a small spot and cabin on the bank of the river about where the Jewett buildings now stand. Some time after laying out the main town plat, and eastern out-lots, the proprietors laid out some forty or fifty out-lots north of the town, represented on the record by a separate plat, containing a trifle over two acres each, and from a part of two of those lots they conveyed to the town an acre and a half for a grave yard. Immediately after the sale of lots, improvements commenced rapidly—by the erection of small log and frame houses and shops, the frames were generally enclosed with split clapboards.

For some years but little attention was paid to improving the street or alleys—gradually, however, they were cleared by the inhabitants for fire-wood and building materials. About the year 1816 a subscription of some two hundred dollars was raised by the citizens and appropriated for the removal of the remaining obstructions out of High street.

Among the first houses erected, was the front brick building, (in the fall of 1812,) on High street on the second lot south of State Street, west side, by John Collet. In 1813 it was opened by a Mr. Payne as a tavern. In

1814, Mr. Collet took possession of it, and kept a very good tavern for a new place, until about the year 1818, when he sold out to Robert Russell, who continued to keep it as a tavern until 1847, when the building was fitted up for store-rooms, and is at present occupied by F. C. Sessions Dry Good Store, B. & C. Ortman's Shoe Store, and Buck and Brown's Jewelry Store. Other taverns were opened about the same time of Mr. Collet's—one by Daniel Kooser, on the west side of Front street, corner of Sugar alley, in a log building. One by Mr. a McCollough on the north-west corner of Front and Broad streets, called the "Black Bear." Another at the northeast corner of High and Rich streets, was kept by Wm. Day, (who had been a boatman,) called a "Grocery,"—it was the common resort of all boatmen engaged in boating stone, and those who came up the Scioto, (at which time a large amount of the heavy articles, such as salt, iron, &c., for the supply of the town and surrounding country were brought up the river in boats,) and so frequent were the broils between the citizens and boatmen, and the boatmen themselves, that the house was called "The War Office." On some occasions as many as ten or fifteen men might be seen at a time, in front of the house, stripped of all clothing but pants and a girt around the waist, preparatory for a regular fight. After the excitement and passions of the crowd had cooled down to zero, the constables would venture to hunt up the combatants and take them before Esquire Shields to receive Justice according to law—sometimes against the loudly expressed disapprobation of the delinquent receiving it. The Squire, however, never suffered the equanimity of his temper to be disturb-

ed by abusive words, but disposed of the business before him by a kind of go-aheadative short hand system. He done the principal part of the business belonging to justice of the peace, for the township, and with the two Constables, was generally known as "Pontus Pilot and his two bull dogs." Mr. Shields was a native of Ireland, endowed with a full share of mental and physical abilities. He had become fully Americanized and was a progressive Democrat in politics and equality. As a bricklayer, he could do two common day's work in one—in surveying and platting, he was equally expeditious, and although actively engaged during the week in business—he generally appropriated Sunday to preaching in town or country, his sermons were always gratis, and probably discoursed as eloquently (for he was a good speaker) as any of our 91,000 clergymen. He was also a poet, and frequently wrote his own hymns. He was generous and philanthropic, having but little of the love of money "for the sake of money"—consequently he never accumulated much beforehand,—after a residence of some 14 years in this place he emigrated to the south, and has since deceased.

Amongst the first settlers, or as early as 1813, were George McCormick, Geo. B. Harvey, John Shields, Michael Palton, Alexander Patton, William Altman, John Collet, William McElvain, Daniel Kooser, Peter Putman, Jacob Hare, Christian Heyl, Jarvis Pike, George Pike, Benjamin Pike, William Long, A. Meneley, and Dr. John Edmiston. Doctor Edmiston was the first physician to locate in the town; Drs. Parsons and Ball practised in Columbus, but resided in Franklinton. About the year 1815, or 16, Dr. Parsons moved over to Columbus, where

he has resided ever since. The first stores opened in Columbus, were one belonging to the Worthington Manufacturing Company, kept by Joel Buttles, in a small brick building on the west end of the lot now covered by the Broadway Exchange building; and one belonging to McLean & Green, kept in a cabin on the south side of Rich-street, just east of where the Mechanics' Hall now stands. About where the Mechanics' Hall stands, in two or three cabins connected together, Christian Heyl kept a bakery and house of entertainment, where he continued until about the year 1816, when he erected the front part of his tavern building, now the "Franklin House," where he continued to keep a public hotel until the spring of 1841.

In the spring of 1815, the census of the town was taken by James Marshall, Esq., and amounted to something over 700. By this time, there were some half dozen or more stores, of which are recollectec those of Alexander Morrison, Joel Buttles, Henry Brown, Delano & Cutler, and J. & R. W. McCoy, and a printing office, issuing a weekly paper called the "Western Intelligencer," owned and conducted by P. H. Olmsted, and Joel Buttles.

The first building erected in Columbus for public worship, was a cabin, by the Presbyterians, on Spring street, in 1814, but it was not used long for that purpose, the meetings being removed to the Franklinton meeting house, where they continued to be held until 1818, when the first Presbyterian Church was organized in Columbus, and a frame building was erected on the west side of Front street, on the second lot from Town street, where Dr. Hoge administered to the Congregation until the pres-

ent brick building, called, "The First Presbyterian Church," was erected, at the corner of Third and State streets fronting the public square, in the year 1826. In 1814, the Methodist Church of Columbus was organized, and the same year they built a small hewed log-house on Town street, between High and Third streets, where Wesley Chapel now stands, which was for some time used for a school house as well as meeting house, when a frame was added to the log, and the house fitted up with permanent seats. In 1823 or '24 the present brick building was erected.

The first Penitentiary was erected in 1813, on the south-west border of the town, on a ten acre lot conveyed to the State by the proprietors of the town. The building was the same that is now occupied for an arsenal. The yard enclosed by a stone wall, was about 150 feet square, on the west of the building. In August 1815, the time the first Penitentiary law went into force, the improvements being completed, Capt. James Kooken was appointed keeper of the prison, and Col. G. Thomas was by him appointed Clerk. In 1818, an addition to the main building was erected, and the yard extended to the foot of the hill, embracing some eight or ten times the area of the original yard. The yard on descending the hill contained three levels, and was at the time much admired, though it was afterwards condemned and the avowed cause of the removal of the institution to its present location. The plan as far as regards health, was probably far superior to the present prison. The second and third levels, from the west wall, were above the top of that wall, and permitted the western winds, which prevail almost constant-

ly, during the summer and fall months, to sweep the greater portion of the yard, and thoroughly ventilate the yard, the main building and work shops, and is the most reasonable theory for accounting for the general good health of the convicts in the prison. In 1822 Barzilla Wright was by the Legislature elected keeper, in the place of Kooken. Wright died in the summer of 1823, and Nathaniel McLean, was appointed by the Governor to fill the vacancy, who was continued by election and re-election by the Legislature, until the spring of 1830, when Byrum Leonard was elected. In 1832, W. W. Gault was elected, who continued in until the convicts were removed to the New Penitentiary in the fall of 1834. The present Penitentiary is a spacious, elegant and durable edifice, situated on the east bank of the Scioto River, about half a mile north of Broad Street, and facing the south. It is composed of a centre building 56 feet long, about 40 feet wide, and four stories high, with two wings, each 200 feet long, and three stories high; built of cut limestone, and of beautiful proportions. The centre building contains the Warden's house, the office and guard rooms, the whole interior of the wings. Each wing contains 350 lodging rooms for prisoners. These rooms are 7 feet long, 7 feet high and  $3\frac{1}{2}$  feet wide, admitting but one prisoner in each. They are entirely detached from the surrounding buildings by a hall 11 feet in width, which extends from the pavement to the roof, and passes entirely round them. Galleries, supported by iron framework, planted in the walls, are placed round each tier of rooms, and suitable stairways erected at one end of

each block, by which the prisoners are enabled with ease, and without confusion, to arrive at their respective lodging apartments.

Each apartment is secured by a grated iron door, safely locked on the outside. The light admitted into these rooms, passes through the outside windows, and thence through the grated doors, and is sufficient to enable the prisoners to read in their rooms.

Ventilators are placed in the roof of the building above the halls. The prison yard is in the rear, and is inclosed by a stone wall 22 feet in height, surmounted by watch boxes at the angles.

Within the enclosure are the workshops, chapel, dining room, kitchen, hospital, &c. These are erected parallel with the outer walls, and at a proper distance from them, so as to leave a hollow square of ground in the centre, containing about one and a half acres. In the centre of this, there is a large stone reservoir erected, which contains a sufficient supply of water for prison purposes, and greatly facilitates the putting out of fires.

The interior of the buildings are built in a substantial manner, two and three stories high. The police of the prison is very complete, probably not surpassed by any prison in the United States.

There were in the prison on the 30th, of Nov. 1849, 332, convicts. During the prevalence of the cholera in the summer of 1849, 116 died of cholera and 6 by other diseases, on the 30th of Nov. 1848, the number of convicts was 425. There is a library belonging to the prison of about 8000 volumes, mostly collected by the Rev. J. B. Findley, late moral instructor to the prison. There

is a sabbath school in a prosperous condition, in which a large number of men and boys who come to the prison unable to read and write are taught both. The Institution is managed by three directors, elected by the Legislature, each for the term of three years, and so arranged, by law, that the term of one of them expires each year.

The State House was erected in 1814, and the State Offices in 1815, on the South-west corner of the public square, (appropriated by the proprietors of the town for the purpose of public buildings,) under the superintendance of Wm. Ludlow, an Agent appointed by the State. In the fall of 1816, the State Offices were removed from Chillicothe to Columbus, and on the first Monday of December the same year, the Legislature commenced its first session in Columbus.

January 26, 1838, the Legislature passed an act providing for the erection of a new State House, on the public square, in Columbus; and in pursuance of said act, Joseph Ridgway, Jr., of Columbus, William A. Adams, of Zanesville, and Wm. B. Vanhook, of Butler county, were, by joint resolution, appointed commissioners for carrying the law into effect. They were required to give notice in certain newspapers and offer a premium of five hundred dollars for the best plan, to be approved by the Legislature, upon which said State House should be erected. A number of plans were furnished by various competitors for the premium; and Henry Walters, of Cincinnati, received the premium, though his plan was not adopted; but from the various plans furnished, the commissioners formed and adopted one, somewhat different from any of the plans presented.

In the spring of 1839, the commissioners appointed Wm. B. Van Hook, one of their own body, superintendent of the work. The high board fence, at present standing around the square, was put up, and a good workshop erected on the square, and other preparations made for working the convicts within the enclosure, in the cutting of stone, &c. Stone were obtained at Sullivan's Lime-stone quarry, and a vast quantity soon delivered in the enclosure. And on the 4th of July, 1839, amidst a suitable celebration, the corner-stone of a large and very durable foundation was laid, and the foundation subsequently raised to a level with the earth, when the inclemency of winter stopped the work.

The whole cost, as far as the preparations of the work had progressed up to this time, appears to have been \$11,585 22. During the session of the Legislature of 1839-40, charges were brought against W. B. Lloyd, a member from Cuyahoga county, which a majority of the Legislature decided as being sustained. A friend of Mr. Lloyd drew up a statement that the charge had not been sustained by the testimony relating to the matter, and expressing an undiminished confidence in the integrity of Mr. Lloyd, which was signed by sixty-three citizens of Columbus. The article with the signers names appeared in the Ohio State Journal on the 17th of February. The publication gave offence to some of the members who had voted to censure Lloyd, and by them was asserted to be an unjustifiable intermeddling with the acts of the Legislature. On the 18th of February, Mr. Flood, member from Licking county, introduced a bill in the lower House to repeal the act for the erection of the new State House, which bill

passed both branches, and became a law on the 10th of March, 1840. From the time of the repeal of the law for the erection of a new State House, the subject of a removal of the seat of Government from Columbus, was agitated. During the session of 1843, a resolution passed the Senate, inviting propositions for permanently fixing the seat of government, but the resolution was rejected by the House. In 1846, the Legislature passed a law permanently fixing the seat of government at Columbus, and provided for the continuance of the new State House.

On the 10th of February, 1816, the town was incorporated as "The Borough of Columbus;" and on the first Monday in May, following, Messrs. Henry Brown, Michael Patton, Jarvis Pike, Robert Armstrong, John Cutler, Caleb Houston, John Kerr, Jeremiah Armstrong, and Robert W. McCoy, were elected the first Board of Councilmen; the last named gentleman has been continued by re-elections a member of the Council, ever since; and is now President of the board under the city charter.

March 3, 1834, a city charter was granted by the Legislature, which divided the town into three wards, and granted four members from each ward, and giving the Council power to increase the number of wards; and on the second Monday of April, following, the following gentlemen were elected the first board under the new charter, to wit:

By the following ordinance passed by the City Council Feb. 18, 1846, the city was divided into five wards, which are the present boundaries of the different wards;

*Sec. 1. Be it ordained and enacted by the City Council of Columbus, That the First Ward of said City shall comprise all the territory in said City north of the centre of Gay street and of a line extending westwardly from the western termination of said Gay street to the Scioto river.*

*That the Second Ward of said City shall comprise all the territory between the centre of Gay street and the centre of State street.*

*That the Third Ward of said City shall comprise all the territory between the centre of State street and the centre of Rich street.*

*That the Fourth Ward of said City shall comprise all the territory between the centre of Rich street and the centre of Mound street, extending to the corporation line, on the west side of the Columbus Feder.*

*That the Fifth Ward of said City shall comprise all the territory south of the centre of Mound street, as above extended in said city.*

*Sec. 2. That this ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, and the several Wards above created shall proceed in accordance with the provisions of the City Charter, to elect members of the City Council on the second Monday of April next; but the present members of the City Council shall hold their offices until their successors are elected and qualified.*

The Columbus Post-Office was established in 1813. Matthew Matthews was the first Post-Master, appointed in the fall of 1813; Joel Buttles, second Post-Master, appointed in the spring of 1814; Bela Latham, third Post-Master, appointed in 1829; John G. Miller, fourth, appointed in 1841; Jacob Medary, fifth, appointed in 1844; Samuel Medary, sixth, appointed in 1847; A. F. Perry, seventh, appointed in 1849.

In 1838, it became a distributing Post-Office, and now affords employment for 12 or 15 hands.

The first attempt to carry a mail otherwise than on horseback, was by Philip Zinn, about 1810, once a week, between Chillicothe and Columbus, which in a short time was increased to twice a week. About the year 1819 Mr. Zinn extended his contract to carry the mail in coaches to Delaware. In 1820-21 an attempt was made to carry the mail in stages from Zanesville by Newark and Granville to Columbus, by a Mr. Harrington, but proved unprofitable, and the coach was run very irregularly. In 1822, Wm. Neil & Co., took a mail contract between Columbus and Chillicothe, to be carried in coaches three times a week. Mr. Neil & Co., about the same time, obtained a contract to carry the mails in coaches from Zanesville to Columbus—the line of coaches was soon after extended to Springfield, Dayton, and Cincinnati. Mr. Neil has ever since been extensively engaged in mail contracts in the west.

In 1814, the first Market House was built by contributions of citizens in the vicinity of the location. It was 50 feet in length, situated in the middle of High street, immediately south of Rich street. About the year 1817,

a new market house was erected by contract with the Council by John Shields. It was a two story frame about 50 feet in length, on brick pillars. The under story was used for a market place for the town. The frame building on the pillars, contained four large rooms and three small ones, which belonged to Mr. Shields, which were rented for various purposes. Mr. Shields thus furnishing a market house for the privilege of having rooms over it. One of these rooms was used for a long time for a printing office. One by Mr. Shields for some time for preaching in, the others for School rooms, exhibitions, &c. The building was at length sold to John Young, who appropriated the rooms to general amusement. In 1829 or '30 the Council bought out Young's interest, and the building was removed, and the one just vacated as a market house, (June, 1850,) was erected by Elijah Ellis, pursuant to contract with the Council. In 1849-50, by an ordinance of the City Council, a new market house was erected on Fourth street, extending from Town to Rich street, about 428 feet in length, and 30 feet wide, with eves projecting on each side 10 feet making the whole width 50 feet. The building is of brick, built in the most durable manner. The central part, for 252 feet, is two stories high, furnishing a Council Chamber on the south end, a City Hall on the north end—in the centre between the Council Chamber and City Hall, on the east side are rooms for the Mayor and City Clerk's offices—on the west side, a guard room and two rooms for the confinement of disorderly persons. The number of stalls on the inside is 64. A brick pavement 10 feet wide extends on each side of the building, and at convenient distances are broad entrances to the interior.

The first bridge over the Scioto river was erected by Lucas Sullivant, of Franklinton; about the year 1818, under a charter from the Legislature—crossing the river at the west end of Broad street, on the road to Franklinton. In 1833-4, the bridge having fell down, Sullivant's right, under the charter, was purchased of Joseph Sullivant, for \$10,000—the citizens of the city and the western part of the county paying \$8,000, raised by subscription, and the county (through the Commissioners) \$2,000. The present bridge was then erected by the Superintendent of the National Road, which is one of the best bridges in the West.

In 1819-20, the U. S. Court House was erected, on the public square, north of the Public Offices, the State appropriating a small amount of uncurrent funds on the Miami Exporting Company, but the greater portion of the cost being raised by subscriptions from the citizens of Columbus. On the completion of the building the U. S. Courts were removed from Chillicothe to Columbus. Harvey D. Evans was then Clerk, and Dr. John Hamm, of Zanesville, Marshal.

In 1824, the county seat was removed from Franklinton to Columbus; and the county courts were held in the United States Court House, until 1840.

The court then, (1824,) was composed of Gustavus Swan, President, and Edward Livingston, Samuel G. Flennigan and Aurora Buttles, Associates; A. I. McDowell, Clerk, and Robert Brotherton, Sheriff.

In 1830, G. Swan was succeeded by Frederick Grimke, and in 1834, Grimke was succeeded by Joseph R. Swan; Swan by Torbert, the present President Judge.

In 1840, the Common Pleas and Supreme Courts, commenced holding their sessions in the New Court House. This is a fine building, the cost of which, appears to have been about forty-one thousand dollars, exclusive of the ground. The two lots upon which the building stands having been bought by contributions of the citizens of the south end of the town, were donated to the county. The County Commissioners afterwards purchased the third lot, so as to have the whole block.

The first Newspaper printed in Columbus was "The Western Intelligencer and Columbus Gazette," removed from Worthington, and published by P. H. Olmsted and Joel Buttles, as early as 1814 or '15, and it has continued ever since, under different proprietors and modifications of title,—and is now published by Scott & Bascom, with the name of "Ohio State Journal."

The second Newspaper, "The Ohio Monitor," was commenced by David Smith and Ezra Griswold, in 1816. Smith soon purchased the interest of Griswold, and continued to publish the paper until the summer of 1836, when he sold out to Jacob Madary; and the Monitor was discontinued, or merged into the Hemisphere.

The "Western Statesman," was commenced in 1825, by Zachariah Mills and Martin Lewis. In 1826 it was passed into the hands of Lewis & Glover; afterwards to Freedom Sever and Elijah Glover. In the spring of 1838, they sold out, and it merged in the Journal office.

In 1829, the "Ohio State Bulletin" was commenced by John A. Bryan and John A. Lazell; at the end of about a year, Bryan sold out his interest to Lazell, though he, (Bryan,) continued to edit it, under the title of the "Co-

"Columbus Sentinel," and it was subsequently sold by Lazell and passed over to George Kesling and John H. Wood and in 1835 was transferred to Scott and Wright, who merged it in the "Ohio State Journal."

About the year 1832, the publication of the "Western Hemisphere" was commenced by Gilbert and Melcher; afterwards, Melcher's interest passed to Russel C. Bryan; and subsequent to that, Gilbert and Bryan sold out to Medary and Mannypenny; it then passed to Sacket Reynolds, for a while, and then back to the Medary's; when S. Medary was first elected State Printer, and the title was then changed to the "Ohio Statesman."

Various other newspapers and periodicals were commenced and published in Columbus for a short time.

For the first few years, the town improved rapidly. Emigrants flowed in apparently from all quarters, and the improvements and general business of the place kept pace with the increase of population. Columbus, however, was a rough spot in the woods off from any public road of much consequence. The east and west travel passed through Zanesville, Lancaster and Chillicothe; and the mails came in crosslines, on horseback.

John Kerr acted as the general agent of the proprietors for the first, second and third years, from 1812 to 1814 or '15, and was then succeeded by Henry Brown, who continued their agent until the close of their business, in the spring of 1817. The usual way of making sales was to receive a third, fourth or fifth of the purchase money in hand, and take notes for the balance, giving the proprietor's bond to make a good deed when the payments should be completed; and it frequently happened, that af-

ter one, or perhaps two payments, and a small improvement had been made, the whole would fall back to the proprietors. The lots for sale all being in the hands of proprietors or those who had bought at high prices from them, and their giving time on the payments kept up the prices, from two to five hundred dollars on any part of the town plat and the prices did not fall much below this until after the year 1820, when owing to the failure of two of the proprietors (McLaughlin and Johnson,) as also numerous other individuals, who had possessed themselves of lots, there was such an immense number of lots offered for sale by the Marshal and Sheriff, and so little money to buy with, that after being appraised and offered, and re-appraised, again and again, finally had to sell; and lots which had years before, been held at two and three hundred dollars, were struck off at from ten to twenty or thirty dollars, and sometimes lower; even down to seven or eight dollars, for a lot on the extremities of the plat.

The out-lots on the eastern border of the town plat, which had been mortgaged by McLaughlin, one of the proprietors, to the U. S. Bank, were for some time offered by an Agent of the bank at \$10 per acre, but could find no purchaser even at that price. In the north-eastern part of the town, real estate depreciated rather lower than any other part of the city. A Mr. David Jones, a common day-laborer, living in this part of the city, purchased a number of the lots with cabins on, at tax sales and otherwise, for a mere trifle,—the cabins he rented out to the poorest class of tenants, got his rent in money if he could, if not, in old furniture or old clothes, and with the

avails extended his purchases of lots. For some years Mr. Jones became a conspicuous man in his part of the city—which on being referred to was called “Jonesburg,” and Mr. Jones as “King David.” On prosperity being restored to the city, Mr. Jones from the rise in value of his lots and land adjoining town, realized a fortune of some \$25,000 or \$30,000.

To add to the depression of business, and price of property, about the year 1822 or '23, the title of Starling's half section, on which the town was located, was called in question. It had originally been granted to one Allen, a refugee, from the British Provinces, in the time of the American Revolution. Allen had deeded it to his son, and the son had mortgaged it, and it was sold at Sheriff's sale, to satisfy the mortgage, and Starling was the purchaser.

It was now claimed by the heirs of Allen, who took various exceptions to Starling's title: first, as to the sale from the old man, Allen, to the son; and, particularly, to the sale by the Sheriff to Starling, on the ground that there was no evidence that an appraisement had been had as required by the statutes of Ohio; and suit was brought by ejectment, against some of the settlers who owned the land in question, first, in the Supreme Court of Ohio, and then in the United States Court for the District of Ohio; Mr. Starling defended the suits, and first engaged Henry Clay of Kentucky, who then practiced in the United States Court in Columbus, as Attorney; but who, owing to his business in Washington City, gave up the case, and Henry Baldwin, then of Pittsburgh, afterwards one of the Judges of the United States Court, was next engaged, who conducted the defence with great ability;

and about the year 1824 or '25, it was finally decided in favor of Starling's title; and the matter was put to rest as to that half section.

The suits against Starling's half section were scarcely decided until a claim came against Kerr and M'Laughlin's half section. They had bought from one Strawbridge who conveyed by an Attorney or Agent, and the deed ran thus: That the Agent conveyed for Strawbridge, instead of Strawbridge conveying by Agent, and was so signed.

“J—— M——, the Agent, [SEAL]

“Attorney in fact for Strawbridge,”

Thus the defect in McLaughlin and Kerr's title was merely technical; but it was contended that this was not Strawbridge's deed, but the deed of the Agent, who claimed no title. And about the year 1824 a quit-claim was obtained from Strawbridge's heirs, by some man purporting to be a New Yorker, upon which suit was brought in ejectment, as in the other case, against one or more of the settlers, owning the most valuable improvements. But by a suit in chancery, about the year 1826, this was all set right, and the title of Kerr and McLaughlin sustained.

The years 1819 and '20, to '25 or '26, were the dullest years of Columbus. But soon after this, Columbus began to look up again. The location of the National Road, and of the Columbus Feeder to the Ohio Canal, gave an impetus to improvements; and by the year 1830, the price of property and improvements of the town had considerably advanced, and from 1830 to '37, improvements, and all kinds of business, were brisk, and the price of real estate ran up at rail-road speed.

A check was given to the rise of real estate in 1839—

40, by the general depression of business throughout the country, but after that period, business again began to flourish, and Columbus has since continued steadily to increase in population and business, and at this time has a population of about 16,000 inhabitants. And in the exports of the productions from the various manufactoryes of the city and vicinity, stands next to Cincinnati.

Columbus is situated in latitude 39 degs. 56 min. north, and longitude 6 degs. west from Washington City, is 106 miles southerly from Sandusky City, 139 southwest from Cleveland, 148 southwestwardly from Steubenville, 184 in the same direction from Pittsburg, Pa. 126 miles west from Wheeling, Va., about 100 northwest from Maritta, 105 northwest from Gallipolis, 45 north from Chillicothe, 90 in the same direction from Portsmouth, at the mouth of the Scioto River, 118 northwardly from Maysville, Ky., 110 northeast from Cincinnati, 68 eastwardly from Dayton, 104 southwardly from Lower Sandusky, and 175 due south from Detroit, Michigan. It is situated exactly on the same parallel of latitude with Zanesville and Philadelphia, from which latter place, it is 450 miles distant; and on the same meridian with Albany, New York, and Milledgeville, Georgia.

There was but little attention paid to manufactoryes in Columbus, other than common mechanics shops, until within a few years past probably on account of there being but little opportunity of conveyance to a market out of the city. The most successful establishments of long standing are the Founderies of the Messrs. Ridgways, commenced in 1823—The Messrs. Gills commenced, about 1838 and Wm. Neil & Co's Manufactory of Stage

Coaches. These establishments are still in successful operation—furnishing employment to a large number of workmen.

Among the most extensive manufacturing establish-  
ments in the city we notice the following.

The Birmingham Works, the property of P. Hayden, situated on State Avenue, and on the east bank of the Scioto river. The main building is built of lime stone, 196 feet long, consisting of a center building of 46 feet, 4 stories high, surmounted by a handsome cupola, and two wings each 75 feet long. In the rear of the center building is the engine house, in which are two engines, one of 50 horse power, the other of 100. Adjoining the engine house, in the north yard, is a mill for rolling scrap iron into bars and rods, capable of producing six or eight tons of bar iron and three tons of rods daily. In this yard, also, is a Smith's shop, 115 feet long by 32 feet wide for making chains, &c. In the south yard is a tannery, 80 by 30 feet, three stories high, designed principally for the manufacture of morocco. The main building is de-  
signed principally for the manufacture of saddlery hard-  
ware and drawing wire. The first floor in the center building is used with machinery for the latter purpose, and about three tons of wire, a part drawn to the smallest size, is made each week. In the north wing, on the same floor, are machines for making buckles, and rivets. The two upper rooms are used for filing, plating and finishing iron and brass work. Over the wire room in the center building is machinery for spinning, carding, &c. Mr. Hayden employs from 100 to 150 hands.

The Plane manufactory of Hall, Case, & Co., situated

on State Avenue, (immediately south of Hayden's factory,) does an extensive business.

M. P. Howlett & Co's Candle and Soap factory, corner of Front and Spring streets.

A. Engler's Candle factory, on Friend street, west end. Pinney & Lampson, extensively engaged in the manufacture of tubs, buckets, scythe sneths, &c., corner of Front and Spring streets.

Messrs. Comstocks & L. Buttles, Planeing machine and Lard Oil factory, at the head of the canal.

The first mill erected within our present city limits, was a sawmill, on the Scioto, some ten or fifteen rods below the New Penitentiary, in 1813, by John Shields. It passed through several hands in a few years; was considered a good property, but soon fell to ruin, and for the last twelve or fifteen years not a vestige of its remains has been perceptible. About the year 1816, the same John Shields erected a flouring mill on the run at the southwest corner of the town, some ten or twelve rods west of the present distillery. The water was brought from where Mr. Peters' tanyard now is, in a race along the side of the bank, and let on to an over-shot wheel. This mill, after standing some twelve or fifteen years and being owned in succession by several individuals, was suffered to go to ruin.

About the year 1820, Col. Jewett and others, erected on the Scioto, west of his white frame house, and a few rods above Dr. Parsons' warehouse, a sawmill, upon a new patent plan. The saw was circular, and was to cut constantly ahead, without any back strokes. It was an experiment and cost them a good deal, without ever answer-

ing any valuable purpose. About the year 1821, Col. Jewett commenced the manufactory of cotton-yarn, by horse power, in a frame building on Front street, where Squire Cherry's three story house now stands; and after experimenting with that some time, and also with the circular saw in the mill, he removed his spinning machinery into the mill, where he carried on the spinning a few years, by water power; but on the erection of the Canal dam, which destroyed the water power, abandoned the whole; and there now remains not a vestige of the building to show where it stood. The frame on Front street, where he first commenced the cotton spinning, was for many years known as "the Old Factory."

About the year 1821 or '22, a woollen Factory for carding, spinning and weaving, was commenced by Ebenezer Thomas, and others, on the west end of the lot now occupied by S. C. Andrews, Esq. It passed through the hands of several owners, without profit to any; the building was removed, and the machinery sold out by piecemeal, under the hammer; and so ended that manufacturing establishment.

About the year 1831 or '32, John McElvain erected a steam sawmill by the canal, where Hunter's warehouse now stands. It was carried on by different persons, (it is believed, without much profit,) for some seven or eight years, when the engine and machinery were disposed of, and a warehouse erected over it, the mill frame answering as part of the warehouse.

As already observed, the original town was laid out in 1812. In the summer of 1814, McGowan's addition, called "South Columbus," was laid out.

In 1830, wharf lots were laid out by the Town Council,

In 1831, a few lots were laid out by John Young, called "Young's addition."

In 1832, a five acre lot of land near the Canal, owned by John McElvain and others, was laid off into lots, and called "McElvain's addition."

In February 1833, Crosby's first addition (between Town and South streets) was laid out; and,

In November, 1833, Crosby's second addition (between South street and South Public Lane) was also laid out.

About the years 1831-2, Robert Brotherton and John M. Walcut, who owned a few acres of an original reserve, sold out some building lots on Town street, which is called "Brotherton & Walcut's addition." They did not have their lots platted, but sold by metes and bounds, as land is conveyed. These lots have, however, subsequently been platted and recorded.

In 1835, Judge Heyl and Dr. Parsons had a small addition of lots laid out in the south-west corner of the town, called "Heyl and Parsons addition."

In 1835, Gilbert's addition was laid out, and in 1839 included in the charter limits.

In 1838, Alfred Kelley, Moylen Northrup, and John Kerr's heirs laid out into lots what they called on their record plat, "the allotment of the central reservation," but which is more commonly called "Kelley and Northrup's addition."

May 27th, 1842, Dr. William Awl laid out four lots on Fourth street, between Friend and South streets, and on October 1st, 1848, he added other fourteen lots to the above four.

August 7th, 1844, C. F. Jager's addition, south of Gilbert's addition, was recorded. Also A. Kelley's subdivision of Great Lots, 1, 2, 3, and 4, on south side of Broad Street, between Fourth and Seventh streets.

January 20th, 1845, Jas. Bryden's addition, and also Krauss' addition, south of Public Lane.

April 3d, 1846, Brush, Jarvis, and Cadwaladers' addition, on Seventh street, north side of Long Street.

July 1st, 1846, R. Armstrong's addition, called "Point Pleasant," south side of Public Lane, west of Front street.

August 1st, 1846, William Philan's addition, on State Avenue.

November 30th, 1846, Deshler and Sullivant's addition, on the east side of Fourth street, between Broad and Gay streets.

December 1st, 1846, D. W. Deshler's addition, on west side of Fourth street, between Broad and Long streets.

September 9th, 1847, William Neil's addition, north of Town Plat, on the west side of High street, and on the north side of North Public Lane.

October 23d, 1847, Jacob Strickler's addition, on north side of Broad street, between Seventh and Washington Avenue.

February, 19th, 1848, C. A. Platt's addition, on the east side of Fourth street, between North street and North Public Lane.

March 2nd, 1848, W. B. Jarvis' 2d addition, on the east side of Washington Avenue, north of Broad street.

March 25th, 1848, W. E. White's addition, on the west side of State Avenue, between Long street and Mulberry alley.

April 3d, 1848, S. Brush's 2d addition, being a subdivision of out-lots, No. 79 and 80, lying immediately south of his first addition.

November 3d, 1848, Jas. Brydea's 2nd addition, fronting on both sides of Eighth and Court streets, between South Lane and South Public Lane.

December 15th, 1848, C. F. Jaeger's 2nd addition, immediately south and adjoining his first addition.

November 24th, 1849, C. F. Jaeger's 3d addition, immediately west and adjoining his 2nd addition.

April 26th, 1850, John Morrison's addition, on the north side of Broad street, and on the east of Washington Avenue, containing 34 lots.

#### OHIO DEAF AND DUMB ASYLUM.

This institution is beautifully situated about half a mile east of the State House. The buildings were erected in the years 1833 and '34. They are spacious, and embracing in their object, architectural beauty, and the conveniences desirable in such an establishment, and adequate to its wants for some years to come. The location of the Asylum is very healthy, as the experience of its inmates can testify, during the time it has been occupied; affording the pleasing reflection, that in its erection, an object was secured second to none in importance, and imparting blessings to its future occupants, essential to their comfort and happiness, while its existence shall be required. The act of incorporation of the Deaf and Dumb Asylum, was passed at the session of the Legislature in 1826 and 27; and the institution went into operation on the 16th of

November, 1829, under the care of the present principal, who was then the only instructor, and whose qualifications to instruct and superintend in this difficult department, were obtained during a year and a half's residence at the American Asylum, Hartford, Connecticut, to which place he had resorted for the accomplishment of this important object.

The Asylum has been in operation twenty years, and we extract from the last annual report, of the superintendent the following remarks: "The whole number of names of the pupils who have been connected with the Asylum for a longer or shorter time during that period, is four hundred and thirty-three, from three hundred and seventy-three different families. The largest number of pupils we have had at any one time from one family, was six. It is a matter of frequent occurrence to receive two or three from one family at the same time. I have never found the infirmity directly hereditary, in any one instance, though it often exists in collateral branches of the same family."

Of the whole number who have been received into the Asylum, one hundred and ninety-two were congenitally deaf and dumb, one hundred and eighty from various diseases and accidents, incident to infancy and childhood, and sixty-one unknown and uncertain. Of the whole number, two hundred and fifty-seven were males, and one hundred and seventy-six were females. Thirty-one have died, and twenty-five have married, but have had no children who are deaf and dumb, although the intermarriages have been almost entirely confined to the graduates of our and of similar institutions. The influence

which the Asylum has been able to exert on all these unfortunate persons, in the way of educational privileges, has been most beneficial and salutary. Those who have left the Institution, almost without exception, are conducting in such a manner as to reflect honor on themselves and the Institution to which they are indebted for their education, and are engaged in various employments like their fellow-men, and are understandingly discharging all their duties as citizens."

The estimated expense for the year ending Oct. 1, 1850 \$12,500. Pupils, males 71, females 64—total 135.

### OHIO INSTITUTION FOR THE EDUCATION OF THE BLIND.

This Institution, one of the creations of modern philanthropy, which have marked the humane spirit of our age, and of this State in particular, was established by an act of the Legislature, passed in the session of 1836-7, and was first put in operation in one of the "Eight Buildings," so called, on Town street, below High, on the 4th of July, 1837, under the direction of Mr. A. W. PENNIMAN. It consisted at first of but five scholars, who increased during the first year to eleven.

The Rev. Dr. JAMES HOGEN N. H. S., Dr. DR. WILLIAM M. AWL, were appointed the first Trustees to carry the provisions of the law, for organizing the school, into effect.

Measures were immediately taken to erect a suitable building for the Institution. The citizens of Columbus generously purchased a plat of nine acres of ground, on the National Road, nearly one mile east of High street, on which a handsome and commodious structure is erected. The building is of brick, with an elevated finished stone basement, about ninety feet in front, with two wings, each near ninety feet in depth. It is five stories high,

including the basement and attic, containing in all fifty rooms, one of which is a large and beautiful apartment, about forty by thirty feet, with a gallery on three sides, supported by eight fluted columns of a chaste style of architecture. This chapel is used particularly for public exhibitions and examinations of the pupils, during the Legislative sessions, and on the occasions of public conventions, which assemble in Columbus from time to time, from all parts of the State.

The whole cost of the building was about twenty-eight thousand dollars—and including the furniture, fixtures, grading the grounds, &c., somewhat over thirty thousand dollars. It was first occupied in October, 1839, with seventeen pupils. In the following year the number increased to thirty-six; in the next to fifty, and in 1842 to fifty-eight, which was the number remaining in July, 1843.

The number of pupils, at this time, June, 1860, is seventy. Estimated expenses, including repairs, from October 1, 1849, to October 1, 1850, \$13,800.

II. Applicants are required, by law, to be between the ages of six and twenty-one years. But pupils are not usually received under ten. In some instances, persons over twenty-one, when free from exceptionable habits, are admitted by the discretion of the Trustees. In all cases, applicants must be free from disease, of sound mind, and of good moral character. A certificate of these facts from several respectable citizens, is required.

III. The terms, where there is ability to pay, and to

all residing out of the State, are one hundred dollars for the term of ten months, payable half yearly in advance. This covers all charges, except clothing and traveling expenses to and from Columbus.

IV. All applicants unable to pay their board and tuition, must bring a certificate of the fact from several respectable persons acquainted with their circumstances. They must come furnished with suitable changes of clothing, with the name marked thereon.

V. The term commences on the first day of October, and continues until the first day of August. Vacation continues two months, during which the pupils return to their homes.

## OHIO LUNATIC ASYLUM.

The Ohio Lunatic Asylum occupies a beautiful lawn north east of the city of Columbus, and is about one mile distant from its public square. It is a stupendous pile of brick and stone work, which presents an imposing appearance as seen from almost every part of the State Capital and surrounding country. The structure faces the south. It is quadrangular, and measures 376 feet in front, by 218 feet in depth. The buildings cover just one acre of ground, and inclose an area of 1864 square yards. The main centre building is three stories and an attic in height above the basement, the wings and new buildings are each three stories; and a walk through all its different galleries and passages exceeds one mile. It contains rising 5,200,000 bricks, and something like 50,000 feet of cut stone. The entire cost to the State was about \$150,000, including the amount of work done by the con-

victs of the Ohio Penitentiary, which constituted a large item in the account.

The principal front displays a handsome columnary facade, ornamented with a fine Ionic portico of free stone, from Waverly, in Pike county, which were beautifully cut by the convicts. There are four columns of this stone; each measuring 3 feet 8 inches in diameter at the base, and 31 feet 2 inches in height. They stand upon a platform of the same materials, and on a level with the top of the basement, which is of cut limestone, and seven feet above the surface of the earth. The centre building is 95 feet 8 inches in width by 45 feet 6 inches in depth. The wings recede 25 feet from the front line, and are each 100 feet long in front, and 119 feet 2 inches long in the rear, leaving a recess behind the centre building, which is 18 feet 6 inches deep, and 56 feet nine inches wide. Each wing unites with a superb verandah, 44 feet square and 3 stories high, which is built of cut limestone, taken from the Scioto quarries 3 miles west of Columbus. Each verandah exhibits two fronts, supported by four massive piers built of the same material, cut in the most perfect manner. Between these piers are stone upstarts which support the windows. The lateral buildings extend to the north from each verandah, and make right angles with the wings of the former edifice. They are each 39 feet wide, and 175 feet long, exclusive of the verandahs. Two lodges for violent and filthy patients occupy the rear of the square, each two stories high and 80 feet long, by 18 feet broad. And the area thus inclosed is divided through its middle by a building of three stories, 114 feet long and 36 wide; which is to be connected with the rear

of the centre building by means of a porch-way of open work, which will be 55 feet long by 14 wide, and two stories high.

Counting parlors, kitchens, verandahs, and all apartments with board floors, and under lock and key, the Asylum contains 440 rooms, and will accommodate about 350 patients, together with all the officers, attendants and assistants necessary to take them in charge and carry on the business of the Institution. The buildings are all covered with tin and chiefly constructed of brick, except the verandahs, basements, cornices and architectural decorations, which are all cut stone. Every part is conveniently arranged, and the whole establishment can be well heated and is thoroughly ventilated.

The Asylum was opened for the reception of patients in the fall of the year 1838. It has been in operation between eleven and twelve years. It will be observed by the tabular statements embraced in the report of the Superintendent; that during that time thirteen hundred and sixty-five patients have been received. Of these, seven hundred and sixteen were males, and six hundred and forty-nine were females. Seven hundred and twenty-six were new cases, (of less than a year's standing,) and six hundred and thirty-nine were old cases, (of more than a year's standing.) Six hundred and thirty-five have been cured, and one hundred and seventy-nine have died. The proportion of males and females cured, is very nearly the same. The proportion of cures in new cases discharged, is  $90 \frac{1}{10}$  per cent., in old cases  $25 \frac{1}{10}$  per cent.,—and the proportion of cures in old and new cases together is  $60 \frac{9}{10}$  per cent.

The number of patients received during the past year, was one hundred and fifty-five. One hundred and sixty-nine were discharged—ninety-four were cured; and thirty died. The proportion of cures in new cases discharged, was  $93 \frac{2}{10}$  per cent., in old cases,  $13 \frac{7}{10}$  per cent.

#### STARLING MEDICAL COLLEGE,

Situated at the corner of State and Sixth streets, is an irregular structure, composed of a center and two wings. The extreme length is 135 feet. The west wing and eight rooms in the center will be devoted to Hospital pur-

poses; the east wing to library and reading room, museum and anatomical purposes, and the center and highest portion to the lecture rooms, which are situated one over the other. The wings and projecting point will be four stories. The extreme height of the tower is about 75 feet. The materials of the structure are brick, with the details and ornamental parts of cut stone.

The Institution was formerly known as the Willoughby Medical College of Columbus, and was removed from Willoughby, Lake county, to Columbus, in 1847. The late Lyne Starling of this city, generously donated \$35,000 for the erection of suitable buildings for the Institute, and the name was changed to "Starling Medical College."

The regular session of lectures commences on the first Wednesday in November, and continues sixteen weeks. A preliminary course of lectures begins on the first Wednesday in October, and continues until the regular session in November.

Fees for a single course of lectures, including dissecting ticket, \$64.

There were 173 students attending the lectures during the session of 1848-'49. Graduated, 50.

#### COUNTY POOR HOUSE.

This institution of charity was erected in 1840, and is situated in the south east part of the city, about one mile from High street. The main building is two stories high, 100 feet in length, and 65 feet in width. An additional building, 35 by 23 feet, contains apartments for the noisy and filthy. Surrounding the buildings are about twelve acres of land belonging to the institution, used for a garden and agricultural purposes. The main building is constructed on the plan of the best hospitals.

#### CITY HOSPITAL,

Erected in 1847; is situated on the south east corner of the Poor House grounds. The patients, when any, as yet, have been placed under the care of the Poor House Superintendent.

#### PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF COLUMBUS.

By an act of the Legislature passed Feb. 3, 1845, the Public Schools of the city were placed under the control of a board of six Directors, to be elected by the voters of the city, who constitute the "Board of Education of Columbus," By the same act the City Council were author-

ised to appoint three school examiners. After the first election two of the Directors to be elected annually and serve for three years. One of the school Examiners is appointed by the Council annually, to serve for three years.

By an amendatory act, passed Feb. 24, 1848, the Board of Education, are required to report to the city Council on or before the first Monday of April, annually, an estimate of the sum necessary, in addition to the school fund derived from other sources, to keep the schools in constant operation during the year, with the exception of reasonable vacations. The President of the Council to give notice to the electors of the sum required, and the qualified voters to vote for or against a tax to raise the amount.

In 1846, a tax of \$8,000 was voted for the erection of buildings suitable for the accommodation of the Public Schools. Three large brick buildings, containing six rooms each, have since been erected, and on the 21st of July 1847, the schools were opened in these new school rooms. The first quarter closed on the 11th of October; the whole number of pupils entered during the quarter, was upwards of nine hundred, and the average attendance between seven and eight hundred.

The schools are at present divided into three grades; Primary, Secondary and Grammar Schools, and a High School in which the higher branches, Mathematics and the Languages are taught. The same general course of study is pursued in all the schools of each grade, and thus is afforded to all who attend them for a series of terms, an opportunity to receive a thorough and consecutive course

of instruction in all the branches, from the alphabet to the highest studies usually pursued in Academies.

The Directors have appointed a Superintendent, to whom is committed the direction of the course of study and instruction in all the schools. In accordance with the plan proposed by him, in addition to the ordinary exercises in spelling, reading, writing, &c., instruction is given in all the schools, in the meaning and use of words, in arithmetic, and the elements of geometry; besides exercises on the elementary sounds of the language; upon the globe and outline maps; and vocal music (singing by note,) is practiced in all the schools. The schools are open five days in the week and six hours per day.

Cost of tuition for each scholar, per quarter, \$1.44.

### GREEN LAWN CEMETERY.

Green Lawn Cemetery of Columbus, is organized under a general statute. The first public movement towards an organized action, on the subject was, a meeting of the citizens at the Council Chamber, on the evening of the 12th of July 1848. On the 26th of August the Association was organized by the election of a board of trustees.

The grounds purchased and held by the Association consist of about eighty-three acres, admirably adapted to the purposes of sepulture, and situate about two and a half miles from the Court House, in a southwesterly direction. Most of the grounds are covered with native forest trees, and were at the time of purchase in a primitive condition, the cost was about three thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars.

The Board of Trustees availed themselves of the assistance of Mr. Howard Daniels, an experienced and competent Architect and Civil Engineer; under whose superintendence, a tasteful and appropriate improvement of the grounds were commenced about the 20th of June, 1849; and in a short time the outlines of the plan of the Cemetery were developed in graceful avenues, convenient walks, numerous lots, occasional pieces of ground reserved for the comfort of visitors and for future improvement and embellishment. A neat and convenient cottage has been erected upon the grounds, for the dwelling of the Resi-

dent Superintendent. Other and more extensive improvements are contemplated, both for purposes of ornament and utility; among which are a chapel, to afford suitable accommodations for funeral services—a Mausoleum, or Vault, for the temporary reception of the dead—and Jet, for the constant supply of fresh running water. These improvements will progress as the Association shall find itself in posession of the requisite means to warrant their undertaking.

An individual wishing to become a member, can do so, by the payment of ten dollars to the Treasurer, and is entitled to one vote, in election of officers; and one vote for each additional ten dollars.
