Dear Sir,

You will have heard before this reaches you of the seizure of the Steamer Black Warrior by the Authorities of this place; of this Steamer we are the agents in this port. Trusting to the long friendship and acquaintance of our senior with yourself, we take the liberty of addressing this letter to you, to explain some of the circumstances connected with this most unjust and illegal act; an act which we consider one of the greatest outrages ever committed on the Commerce of the United States, under the authority of a Government at peace with them. We enclose you herewith a copy of our protest, as well as that of Capt Wallace which will inform you of the exact state of the affair; also the opinion of one of our first lawyers, whom we have got to draw up the enclosed statement, with the several

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laws which bear on the case. We have thought<sup>2</sup> that this might be of service to you in forming your opinion of the case, and we wish you to make such use of it, as well as of the protests, as you in your good judgement may think <sup>most</sup> proper for the interests of ourselves and of the owners of this steamer and her cargo.

This steamer is one of the finest sailing out of New York, is nearly new, and valued at about Two Hundred Thousand Dollars. The cargo which was on board is valued at something near One Hundred Thousand Dollars more, making a total of about Three Hundred Thousand Dollars, of property belonging to citizens of the United States, passing from Mobile to New York (in transit at the port) and seized by the authorities for a slight informality of the Captain in making and presenting his manifest on the arrival of the ship. This informality has not only been countenanced by the Custom House officers ever since this steamer, com-

- increased running, which has been twice each month for the past eighteen months, but was actually requested by the former Collector, over two years since, to be done, for the reason that the great length of the manifests, did not give time during the few hours the Steamer stopped here, to have the translations made and recorded, as is the rule, before the vessel can be cleared; he therefore told the Clerks to have them entered and despatched in Ballast, when there was no cargo for Havana. This sudden attack on the Black Warrior, without giving any notice of their intention not to permit this informality any longer, is supposed to be from causes entirely unconnected with their desire to have the rules of the Custom House conformed to. (There) There is a deep and revengeful feeling by the new officers from Spain against the American interests here, and particularly against the Steamers; and there is not the least doubt in our minds that this is done and countenanced

by the superior Authorities for purposes of revenge. Spanish pride was wounded in the present City affair; they are also angry that American newspapers still find their way into the Island from the Steamers, although the strictest measures are taken to prevent it; and more particularly at this present time, for having been obliged to give up the nine seamen who have been so long in prison. The Steamers "Crescent City" from New York and the Philadelphia from New Orleans, arrived yesterday in this port. Both Captains handed their manifests to the boarding officers, as in Ballaet; the boarding officers requested the Captains to make their manifests "in transitu" in case they had cargo on board, and these officers waited until the Captains could make new manifests. Had the same courtesy been displayed towards the Capt of the Black Warrior he would at once have made a new manifest. The Authorities have finished discharging the cargo today. It is placed in the stores, and they have possession of the vessel; what they intend doing next

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we have no means of knowing, as we are not <sup>5</sup> permitted an interview with the Captain General, and our memorials are not noticed. Mr Robertson the acting Consul has given all information to the State department on the subject, and our object in writing to you is, is that we hope that your long acquaintance and friendship with our seniors, will cause you to take more interest in this case, and that you will make such use of the protest &c as is proper. We do not know but we should have sent it to the State department; if so will you please have it done. Judge Wright, former Comptroller of the State of New York, Mr Wheeler and Mr Coonwell, all lawyers of high standing in that State, are here, and knowing the facts in the case, pronounced it to be one of the most unjust and atrocious acts that was ever committed by a civilized government, and we have no chance of justice, unless the Government at home take some decid.

With the end of avoiding deferment to the passengers that ought to have left to-day for Am. Str. Black Warrior, & that have not done so, for the resistance of the captain (in my opinion without any reason) in allowing the revenue officers to discharge the goods condemned by the Custom House (Caídos en pena de comiso).

In order not to cause any prejudices to the commerce, to which we must give protection and help, and for a just deference to you as consignee of said vessel as also to the Captain himself, in order that the men who compose the crew of said vessel do not interrupt their working and profession, I propose to you:

That you send one delegate to intervene in the discharge of said vessel and in the delivery of the baggage to the passengers, as, without this formality, the discharge will not be con-

tinued, nor any operation whatever will be done,  
And that the Captain gives a security to be  
present when called for, (à l'ester à l'ordinaire)  
that will be purely personal.

And under this circumstances the  
clearance of the vessel in ballast will be facili-  
tated, as is expressed in the manifest, with all  
which you will save your responsibility and  
prejudices will be avoided to all.

I hope that you will cooperate by  
your part to the only possible arrangement  
under the present circumstances, and that you  
will know the good desire that encourages the  
Maritime Administration to make difficulties  
disappear.

Honorable Board of 7<sup>th</sup> 1857

In a diplomatic manner you are informed of the seizure of the Black Warrior. This outrage which has been committed on the flag of your country needs prompt redress, and justice can only be rendered to the owners of the vessel. As the seizure was made, as the demands for redress should be made. As a Briton, I will not de-  
ceive you. I enclose you the Hawaiian Re-  
port, in which you will find an extract of  
our Customs regulations. The Black Warrior  
on her arrival manifested in the usual man-  
ner, that is in the manner she had been al-  
lowed to enter previously. Custom should  
have shielded her from seizure, but even  
putting that aside, the Captain or Com-  
mander desired or asked permission to make the  
amendment according to law, within the  
prescribed time, but was not allowed to  
do so. This should have prevented any seizure.  
The seizure is illegal because custom had  
permitted the steamers, not bringing cargo  
for Hawaii, to enter and clear in ballast.  
It was illegal because the captain or his  
agent offered to make the correction, and  
thirdly it was illegal because it was made  
before the expiration of the twelve hours  
which are allowed for amendments.

There can be no doubt, but this act of the Spanish Government is a gross outrage, only to be sustained by the enemies of the United States. Lawyers here tell me that the laws will condemn the acts of the Goby, but what are laws when the officer of the Govt. have absolute power. Some there are who consider that the United States Govt. will do nothing in the matter and affirm that if the Spaniards were to burn down New York, that the Govt. would then even be passive. The flag of my country is seized and repeated, and your might be so, but you courage. You Americans, and I am acquainted with you 22 years. I find, often justify the conduct of your enemies, fearing your own heads. Through misrepresentation often, Americans are made to appear in the wrong, when they are wrong, and often innocent Americans suffer for the conduct of culpable ones. No statesman you are too busy and noisy, and spend your time in angry debate about trifles, instead of turning your attention to the true interest of your country. However, Genl. Pierce, you are older than I am, and I shall not lecture you or any American of the slightest capacity & experience for we in conversation always agree. I return to the business of the Steamer, the owners

of which must suffer should you not energetically attend to the affair. You need not fear to act as a man. The Govt here is wrong, and that must appear clear to you, even from the slight particulars given by myself.

If this is allowed to go to Madrid for consideration, and then to Washington & so on, what is to become of the owners of the vessel & those of the cargo, why should these suffer; perhaps now, many parties are almost ruined by the occurrence.

The case is not intricate or difficult to unravel. The fact is, that the Govt expected to find something else besides the cotton onboard, and that perhaps led to their outrageous conduct. Send what force you have, demand redress and should that not be immediately granted blockade Havana, make reprisals and may God attend you. Have courage, whatever you do.

more afraid to lose their employment through  
the Spanish Govt than through their own. This  
they fear the Spanish Govt.

The Duties of 35½ and 29½ per cent, are on foreign goods, imported in foreign vessels, from foreign ports, on the specified valuations.—In Spanish vessels from foreign ports and on foreign produce and manufactures imported directly from the Peninsula, in Spanish vessels however, those at 35½ per cent, pay 10, and those at 29½ per cent, 8 per cent less.—Spanish productions and manufactures, of the same class as those charged 35½ per cent from foreign ports, imported from the Peninsula in foreign vessels, pay 16 per cent less, and in Spanish vessels 26 per cent less, and those of the same description as the foreign articles, which are charged 29½ pay 13 and 20 per cent less, excepting rice, which is charged 30 per cent less, and flour 2¢ per bbl.—Wine, Brandy and all kinds of Liquor pay besides the mentioned an additional Duty of 50 cents per pipe, 25 cents per half pipe or Hhd. and 12 cents per doz Jars or Bottles. All Imports & Exports pay besides the mentioned duties, 1 per cent Balanza upon the said duties;—except, Sp. flour, cordage, tafia, molasses, sugar & segara.

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All Spanish products imported from the Peninsula in Spanish Bottoms (except flour which pays 16 rials per brl) are subject to a duty of 6 1/2 p cent on the valuations in the Tariff.—All kinds of machinery, & implements for sugar mills Steam Engines for Sugar Estates are free of Duty. Agricultural machinery & implements pay 24 p cent ad valorem.  
Jerked Beef resulting very often partly damaged, enjoys a deduction in the duties of 6 p cent on the valuation for importation from this side of the line & 14 p cent for such from the other side.  
Deposit.—All goods imported in foreign vessels exceeding 50 & in Spanish 60 tons burthen, except perishable provisions, bulky articles and liquors, may be put in deposit for an indefinite term, paying 1 per cent inward and 1 per cent outward duty on the valuations in the Tariff each year. When entered for home consumption, they are liable to the corresponding duty.—If sold in deposit the exporter pays the outward duty.—By an order of our Intendant the following articles will also be admitted to Deposit in future: olive-oil, rice, beer, heniquen & majagua rope, soap, marble slabs, alabaster, cider, vinegar, red and white wine.  
Act. of cust. regula.—Every Ship-master is bound to have on his arrival ready for delivery to the boarding Off-

cers of the Revenue, a manifest containing a detailed statement of his cargo & ship stores, & in the act of landing it over, has to write thereon the oath that he has no other cargo on board & the hour when he delivers it, taking care that it be countersigned by the boarding Officers. Within twelve hours, which begin to count from the moment he delivers such manifest until 7 o'clock in the evening and again from 6 o'clock in the morning until the moment he said 12 hours elapse, he can make any alteration by presenting a separate note in which he specifies the errors he may have committed in the manifest. After the expiration of these 12 hours no alteration will be permitted.—goods not manifested will be confiscated without remedy & if their value should not exceed One thousand Dollars the master of the vessel will be liable to pay a penalty of double the amount of such non-manifested goods: if they exceed that sum, & belong to the master or come consigned to him, his vessel, freight & other emoluments will be forfeited to the Revenue.—goods over manifested will pay duties as if they were on board.—goods not manifested but claimed in time by a Consignee will be delivered up to the latter, but the master in this case will be subject to a fine equal in amount to that of such goods.—Gold & Silver not manifested by either master or Consignee, are liable to a Duty of 1/2 p cent.

Goods falling short of the quantity manifested, when landed, & not being included in any Invoice of Consignee will render the master liable to a penalty of 200 dollars for each package so falling short.—Every master must present himself within 24 hours after his arrival, at the Customhouse in order to swear to his manifest, in neglect of which he is liable to a fine of 1000 dollars.—Every Consignee is obliged to present a detailed note of goods within 48 hours after the arrival of a vessel, if not, such goods are liable to 2 p cent extra duty.—The same is the case if such notes do not contain a statement of the number of pieces, contents, quantity, weight & measure. Every vessel is required to bring a Bill of Health certified; by the Spanish Consul at the port of her departure or that nearest to it otherwise they are placed in quarantine.
