Dear Sir,

Will you have the kindness to inform me,
if a person engaged as Post Master, Deputy, P.M. etc.,
or in any other capacity, whereby he is exempt, by
"Law of the United States" from performing Militia Duty,
is induced while so engaged to become a member
of a Volunteer Militia Company, if he equally binds
with members not so exempt, to leave in said com-
pany and to pay the fines & imposts imposed upon him
for nonattendance to Militia duty when such atten-
dance would interfere with the performance of
his duties as an attachee of the Post Office Dept.
and in case such Company is called into service
or is ordered to rendezvous at some place other
than where it was organized, would not such
person be exempt from attending and doing service
in said Company? By giving the above your attention
and favoring, at your convenience, with a reply, thank
you will greatly oblige you &c &c
