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PREFACE.

The want of a trustworthy and complete guide to the Charities of New York has long been felt; and at the public meetings held on the 20th of November, 1873, and the 23d of February, 1874, the desire to have such a volume of reference was strongly expressed. The Bureau of Charities has, in consequence, undertaken the task of preparing such a work, and the accompanying pages are the result of information obtained from the most trust-

worthy sources available.

This Directory does not, however, pretend to be perfect. Omissions and occasional inaccuracies will doubtless be detected, but this is, on various accounts, unavoidable. There is especial difficulty in obtaining and tabulating facts for the first time, while the frequency of changes in the names of executive officers, and occasionally in the locality of the institutions, interferes with the completeness desirable. Such as it is, however, it is presented to the public in the hope that in any future edition all such deficiencies will be remedied. The expense and trouble of making such a compendium fall principally upon the first attempt. It will be easy to continue, either annually or periodically, a future issue of this work, if it be desired by the public. There would be an evident advantage in comparing periodically the development of the changes in management or the multiplication or diminution of the different societies in this city.

It would obviously be desirable to furnish a more copious statement concerning the various institutions; and this it is hoped will be produced, if not by this Bureau, by some other authority. Indeed it might not be improper to apply State or city funds to such an object. The example which has been so satisfactorily set by the Board of State Charities of Massachusetts, proves how much can be effected by the judicious application of public money in this way. The Appendix to the Secretary's Report contains a complete account of all the charities of the State and cities of Massachusetts. A similar work, published by authority, would be of great value at the present time in New York. There would probably be much less reluctance to furnish all the statistics and information required for such an object to a Board appointed by the State, which should command the public con-

idence and contain full powers for making such inquiries.

It is necessary to explain that the plan of this Directory has been to classify under different heads the various charities and charitable institutions of the city. There has been no intention to exclude any deserving charities, but





where no returns have been furnished to the Bureau after application, it has been manifestly impossible to print facts of any value about them. This remark applies particularly to institutions connected with churches and other religious denominations. Some few institutions have been omitted intentionally, for sufficient reasons. On the other hand, it is possible that some of the institutions in this work do not fairly come within the strict definition of the word "Charity," but it is difficult to distinguish in all cases the exact limitation of the objects of each society. It may also seem to some that well-known names are omitted, but the object has been to confine the enumeration of societies to those connected directly with charitable relief in this city. It should, however, be distinctly understood by those who may make use of this Directory, that the Bureau expresses no opinion whatever on the merits of any society mentioned in these pages. It merely publishes such facts as are believed to be on the whole reliable.

The Public Institutions are ranked in a separate division, as a work of this sort would be obviously incomplete without such reference; but as the law requires that full reports shall be made annually with respect to their con-

dition, it is unnecessary here to enter into details about them.

The balances remaining over from the previous year's returns are included generally under the last year's receipts. The Bureau, however, does not hold itself responsible for the absolute accuracy of the figures given—it has endeavored to verify them to the best of its power, within the time at its disposal. The number of Societies and Institutions recorded amounts to 194—or, including branch establishments, 286—arranged under twelve different classes.

In this Directory of Charities the Bureau has inserted intentionally the names of the principal executive officers, with the view of enabling the public to judge to some extent of the respectability of each society, by which assistance is requested. It may be suggested that much imposition would be prevented if collectors were always required to produce properly attested credentials from their respective societies, before receiving subscriptions, and, in the case of incorporated societies, the seal should always be affixed to such credentials.

The thanks of the Bureau are due to the secretaries and executive officers of the various societies and charitable institutions throughout the city, and pre-eminently to the Commissioners of Charities and Correction for the assistance which has been generally rendered during the prosecution of this work.




