As I write from memory, I cannot give you  
full details -

My Staff was, Capt L Riddick. A.A. General ,

I commanded this splendid Brigade until after the battle of Seven Pines, and was in command of the advance line of the division when ordered to Monroe, North Louisiana as Com<sup>t</sup> of Conscripts, and Military Com<sup>t</sup> of N Louisiana from & between Red & Mississippi Rivers - in 1863 Senator Sparrow was prejudiced against me and prevented my promotion - I applied for field duty, and was relieved of all <sup>my</sup> until I rec'd command of S.C. Reserves, with which I served until the end of the war, from Honey Hill S.C. to Smithfield N.C. being in all the battles of that campaign, and then took the Brigade home to Chester S.C.

As a classmate of R.E. Lee, J.S. Johnston & D.H. Hill
