# 3 Raids Bare Arms Caches Here; 5 Persons Arrested

St. Gen. Hernando Hernandez, chief of police, reported the seizure yesterday of two arms caches, one in Luyano and another in Cerro, and the arrest of five persons.

A physician, Dr. Hector Haces Hernandez, of the Emergency Hospital, was arrested in connection with the arms cache in Cerro.

Police said the first arms cache was seized yesterday morning at an apartment on Juana Alonso street No. 706 in Luyano. The tenant, Orlando Trujillo Pico, 28, was asleep when police walked in. Weapons uncovered included 12 rifles, 11 hand grenades, 22 machinegun ammunition belts, 3,000 cartridges and "a large quantity of Communist literature."

Minutes later police went to a garage on Juana Alonso and Calzada de Luyano, a scant two blocks away from the apartment, and seized a truck that was being painted. Police said the truck had been used in the armed assault on the Presidential Palace last March 13. The garage owner and two employees were arrested.

Less than two hours later Col. Conrado Carratala and a group of police agents went to a house on Florencia street No. 117, between San Gabriel and San Anselmo, in Cerro, where they seized 30 rifles, assorted hand grenades, and several

police and army uniforms, among them one with colonel's insignia.

The last tenant of that house, police said, was Pedro Monson, who was among those killed in the frustrated attack on the Presidential Palace.

Dr. Haces Hernandez, an eye, ear and nose specialist at the staff of the Emergency Hospital, told police he knew Monson, on whom he had

performed an operation on a cyst. He said Monson once admitted to him that he had some weapons hidden in his home but that he never entered Monson's home or saw the weapons. The physician and surgeon emphasized he had no political connection whatsoever.

# Modern Life's Toll: Stress and Tensions

ST. LOUIS, March 27 (AP) — Stresses and tensions of modern life have made some men and women sterile, Dr. Robert N. Creadick of Duke University said today.

Emotions and stress can affect body hormones and nerves with consequent effects on fertility, he told the American Academy of General Practice.

Study of psychological factors in sterility has been a major part of newest scientific efforts to help such couples, Dr. Creadick said.

Sterility is most times due to physical causes, some of which can be detected and corrected. In about 30 per cent of cases, failure to have children is due to lack of fertility in the husband.

Emotional stresses apparently act through a vital brain center, the hypothalamus, the physician explained.

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street No. 128 in Luyano, who was picked up in connection with the arms cache seized in her neighborhood, denied police charges that she had weapons hidden in her home. She admitted, however, that she knew Orlando Trujillo, the youth in whose apartment police seized the first arms cache yesterday, and that she had been a member of the Cuban Revolutionary Party.

The weapons seized in Cerro were sent to the 10th Police Station. The truck picked up at the Luyano garage was taken to the Bureau of Investigations.

Late last night police reported the seizure of another arms cache at an apartment on Linea and 2 in Vedado yesterday afternoon.

Police said the tenant is an "aunt" of Calixto Sanchez, the former secretary general of the National Federation of Air workers, who resigned and fled Cuba last Sunday after admitting he had been involved in revolutionary activities.

The arms cache consisted of two machineguns, two .45 caliber pistols, two .45 caliber revolvers, two .38 caliber revolvers and a suitcase full of cartridges.
