Bunch, at cards, which the latter agreed to pay at a certain time. When Fannin called at Bunch's room he found it locked, and walked down the steps. Before reaching the foot of the steps Bunch came to the door and called him, and immediately fired both barrels of a double barreled shot gun at him, and then run down the stens and heat him with the gun. Fannin served as an officer in the Texas revolution, and in the Mexican wer, and was a brother of the hero who fell at the Fannin massacre. Col. Bunch had not been

arrested.
