THE ELECTION IN KANSAS. Gentlemen who left Leavenworth City, in Kansas, on the 7th instant, have communicated to the

St Louis Democrat the annexed intelligence in reference to the Kansas election of the 4th igstant, which, it is said, passed off with but little disturbance :

At Kickapoo precinct the pro-slavery majority was 864. Doniphan county gave about 500 majority for the proslavery t cket. At Atchison the Free-State ticket was elected by about

thirty majority, with the probable exception of Mr. Hereford, a Senator, and one of the members of the

Convention which framed the Lecompton constitution, and who voted to have it submitted to the people. Ile

was supported in part by the Free-State men.

Johnson county gave 1,900 for the pro-slavery ticket,
(McGee and Oxford frauds repeated)

Rourbon county gave 430 pro-slavery majority.
Douglas county gave 500 majority for the Free-State ticket.

Other parts of the Territory had been but partially

heard from, and the returns received led to the impression at Leavenworth that the pro-slavery men had elected their State officers, but that the Free-State party had

carried the Legislature. The vote was small, more than half the voters of the Territory having decline I voting for State officers, though a very decided expression was given against the Lecompton constitution, the majority

against it having been placed at ten thousand. It is said the Democratic party in the Territory is "all split to

pieces," with a very large majority bitterly opposed to the Lecompton constitution. We learn from the Leavenworth Ledger that the average majority given at that place for the Free-State
