

Man Shot.

Easton, K. T., Aug. 7, 1857.

DEAR GEN.—This morning about two o'clock there was a man shot here and killed, by the name of John Cotteral, for horse stealing. The facts in the case are these. He had been at work for the last month for one of our citizens by the name of Rev W. Jones, his time was out yesterday. Some three weeks since he went to a young man here and told him that he came to steal horses, and wanted him to join him, which the young man refused to do, he then told him if he told upon him he would kill him. The young man nevertheless, informed upon him. The citizens then told him to pretend to join him, and last night was fixed upon to steal the horses, everything was arranged, and the men stationed to arrest him. About two o'clock he came along riding the horse of a Mr. M. H. Langly. One of the men seized the horse from where he had been stationed, the man jumped off of the horse and broke to run, he was ordered to stop, and not doing so, was shot dead upon the spot.
