

New-York Nicaraguans.

NEW-YORK, Monday, Jan. 19, 1857.

To the Editor of the New-York Daily Times:

In drawing out the list of officers who have left New-York for Nicaragua, published in your edition of Friday last, I omitted, strange to say, the name of one whose thorough military education, whose scientific attainments, whose indefatigable energy and indomitable courage, make him the most important acquisition to the cause of General WALKER of any who have left this or any other State to join his fortunes—Gen. HENNINGSEN.

Gen. HENNINGSEN has seen considerable service in Europe. He served through the Carlist war in Spain, and under KossUTH, in Hungary, held a high military position, that of Lieutenant-General, I think, and participated in many of the battles. He went to Nicaragua in October of last year, and took with him the mortars and howitzers that have done such good service since. Upon his arrival he immediately received the commission of General, and his late services are familiar to every reader. It is to be hoped that his invaluable services may be long assured to the country he serves.

Major SCHWARTZ also left New-York in March, 1856, and was made a Major in the Ordnance Department. He is yet there, and I think was promoted to a Colonelcy at Massaya.

Lieut. A. J. HIGGINS went out to Nicaragua in March or April of last year, was made 1st Lieut., was at the battle of Santa Rosa, and died of fever in Granada. Lieut. H. was a brother of Capt. HIGGINS, of the steamship *Hermann*.

Dr. TRAPHAGEN went out in May last; was made Assistant Surgeon, and died there.

Lieut. H. STOLL went out in December, 1855; was Adjutant to Col. BRUNO NATZMER; was killed at Rivas.

Lieut. NAGLE went from here in September, 1856; yet there.

Allow me to call your attention to a couple of errors in my communication of Friday last. Instead of Capt. J. C. FARNHAM, it should read Capt. J. M. FARNUM; and instead of OLIVER H. OAKSMITH—ALVIN H. OAKSMITH.
